






We are writing to you concerning the 16th Annual Dean & Creech Reunion to be held on September 2, 1990, at the Carl Perkins Building in Morehead, Kentucky beginning at 11 a.m. We hope all roads lead to Morehead for this Reunion. Your ancestors lived here, walked on this soil, built roads, homes, inventions and contributed to the advancement of this nation. They have left their mark on history in Kentucky.

James H. Dean and Nancy Fields Dean came to Carter County, Kentucky from Scott County, Virginia in 1862. There are many descendants from this couple. Children of W.H.H. Creech and wife Fannie Smith were: Dave, Grant, James, Larsh, Lish, Will, Cora, Margaret, Sarah, Cecila, Jane, and two babies dead.

A few cemeteries where relatives are buried in this area are: Creech, Brown, Fultz, Caudill, Dean, Hayes, Trough Camp, Enterprise, Callihan, Garvin Ridge, Conley, New Sill, Forest Lawn, Pleasant Valley, Bowen Chapel, Grahn, Thomas, Mocabee, Olive Hill, Tackett, Clay, and Several others. Information on these can be supplied for researchers.





# The Haldeman-Hayes Crossing Community Gourd Festival

Lloyd Dean of Morehead, Kentucky hung up his FFA jacket over 60 years ago, but he is still using the lessons he learned about leadership and service to make a positive difference in his community.

Mr. Dean joined the FFA in 1947 at the recommendation of his cousin. Mr. Dean participated in judging contests and was the pitcher on the FFA softball team. His farming program included corn and hog production. He received regional recognition for his work with corn, hogs, pasture improvement, and farm improvement.

Mr. Dean's FFA Advisors were Charles Hughes and Carl Sinclair. He states that they were, "great role models," who really loved the FFA organization and the boys who were members. He credits FFA and his Advisors for making him want to stay in school at a time when many young men did not graduate.

On June 8, 1950, Mr. Dean received the State FFA Degree. In recognition of this achievement, he received \$5 from the Mid States Steel and Wire Company. Although the \$5 was spent many years ago, he still has a letter of congratulations from the company president. Mr. Dean remained active in FFA after graduating from high school and in October of 1951 became one of the first young men from eastern Kentucky to be awarded the American Farmer Degree. He and one of his advisors rode the train to Kansas City where he received the Degree at the 18<sup>th</sup> National FFA Convention.

Mr. Dean went on to attend college at both the University of Kentucky and Morehead State University where he graduated in 1959. From 1953-1957 he served his country in the United States Air Force. In October of 1954 he married his wife of nearly 60 years Arvetta. He served as a teacher and guidance counselor at Felicity High School in Felicity, Ohio from 1959-1963. He was counselor for 22 schools in Carter County from 1963-1970 and then served as counselor for Rowan County High School from 1963-1991. He retired in June 1991.

In 1959, Mr. Dean helped found the Morehead United Pentecostal Church. He served the church as Pastor until 2002. He continues to serve as Pastor Emeritus and remains involved as a Sunday School Teacher.

In addition to being a pastor and guidance counselor, Mr. Dean has served his community in a variety of ways. He has been involved with numerous community groups including the Rowan County Historical Society, the Rowan County Farm Bureau, the Rowan County 4-H Council, the Haldeman-Hayes Crossing Fire Department, the Kentucky District Campground of the United Pentecostal Churches. Mr. Dean has also conducted genealogical research on various branches of his family and has organized an annual family reunion.

Mr. Dean is a strong believer in the value of Agricultural Education and FFA. He believes that every student in America could benefit from being involved in the organization and has worked tirelessly to see that Rowan County students had the opportunity to be involved in FFA. He was one of ten charter members of the Rowan County FFA Alumni and has written numerous letters supporting Agricultural Education and FFA in Rowan County. According to State FFA Executive Secretary Matt Chaliff, "Lloyd Dean was providing support for the Ag Program at Rowan County when no one else was. His support played a key role in the school system maintaining the program."

In 2009, Krista Hayslip was hired as the Teacher of Agriculture and FFA Advisor at Rowan County High School. Ms. Hayslip says that Mr. Dean has been a supporter of the program and has played a role in the growth and expansion that has taken place over the last four years. In 2012, Tanner Utterback became the second young man from Rowan County to receive the American FFA Degree. Lloyd Dean's contributions to the program came full circle when he posed for a picture with Tanner shortly after the National FFA Convention. In the photo, both men- sixty years apart in age- proudly hold their American FFA Degrees.

Mr. Dean's innumerable contributions to his community would not have been possible without the lessons he learned in FFA. He says, "I gained knowledge, wisdom, ambition, and desire for improvement." Those lessons were well learned and have allowed Lloyd Dean to impact hundreds of lives for over 60 years.





## Lloyd Dean

### Guidance Counselor, Minister And Organizer

Some know him as a guidance counselor. Others know him as a pastor.

For most of his life, Lloyd Dean of Hays Crossing has been working in the fields of education, church work, and community development.

Dean's full-time job is guidance director at Rowan County Senior High School. On weekends he serves as pastor of the Morehead United Pentecostal Church. In his spare time he participates in a variety of activities, such as organizing the first Hays Crossing Gourd Festival

earlier this year.

Dean, 53, was born in East Chicago, Ind. But he has lived most of his life in Kentucky, with the exception of 1953-57, when he served in the Air Force in the states, Guam and England. Also, during the years 1959-63 Dean and his wife, Arvetta Dorcas Plank, lived in Felicity, Ohio, where he taught and served as guidance director at Felicity Franklin School.

He attended a one-room school at Little Perry, before going on to Haldeman Elementary, Haldeman High School and, eventually, Morehead High School. Dean also attended Morehead College and the

Lloyd also made Ky. State Farmer in FFA in 1950 and American Farmer in FFA in 1951

University of Kentucky.

But his vivid memories of life at Haldeman are what motivate him to get involved in area activities. And in that light, he is somewhat of a noted local historian.

In 1980 he organized the first annual Haldeman Reunion. The reunion has become a popular event with people coming from about a dozen states.

"I've always been interested in my community," Dean said. "I'm interested in improving and developing the community, and I'm interested in activities in which people can participate."

He cited the Haldeman reunion as

an example of such an event. "We had lots of people attend who weren't from Haldeman," Dean said.

"My dad worked in the brickyard. I remember very well how life was back then," he said.

He now applies that knowledge in his job as guidance counselor.

Dean applies his knowledge of the area and its people to his job in the school system.

"I can do more for these students because I know most of their background, and that helps me better serve them," he says.

The hardest part of being a

guidance counselor, Dean says, is attempting to give personal attention to more than 1,000 students.

"I enjoy working with students, but I just don't have the time to work with all of them on an individual basis," Dean said.

Dean is just as dedicated to the church he founded in 1959

That point is illustrated by the fact that while he was working in Ohio for four years he still managed to return to Morehead each weekend.

"I only missed two Sundays, and one was because the Ohio River was flooded and I couldn't get across," Dean said.

His church has a membership of about 40. "It would be higher, but I really don't have the time to be a full-time minister," he adds.

He also has a half-hour weekly radio program, which he believes has been well received in the area.

The program, "I Have Hope," airs at 11 a.m. each Saturday on WMOR.

"It has a pretty wide audience," Dean said, "People listen regularly and they say they enjoy it."

In addition to all these activities, there is much more to the multi-faceted life of Lloyd Dean. He also:

✓ Organized the Dean and Creech reunions which began in 1975.

✓ Is one of 10 charter members of the Rowan County FFA Alumni Association.

✓ Organized the Rowan County Historical Society in 1977 and served as president until January, 1983.

✓ Had signs placed at the entrance to the communities of Hays Crossing and Haldeman.

✓ Is a member of the Kentucky Historical Society, Filson Club and several other historical and genealogical societies.

✓ Is a former president of the Rowan County Alumni Association.

✓ Is a former president and charter member of the Eastern Kentucky Personnel and Guidance Association.

✓ Is a former member of the Rowan County Farm Bureau Board of Directors.

✓ Has served on the Rowan County 4-H Council for several years.

✓ Organized the Rowan County Spelling Bee in 1973.

✓ Organized an observance for Flag Day in 1976.


Dean will try to start up the Flag Day observance again next year.

"It lasted for two or three years," he says, "but then it stopped."

"It's something I'd like to continue. Maybe if we can get the Army Reserves, the MSU Military Science Department, the National Guard and the American Legion all involved, we could have an observance for Flag Day," he adds.

The ceremony Dean organized in 1976 involved placing a flag for each Rowan Countian who died in World War I, World War II, Korea and Vietnam.

"I've always been interested in Rowan County," Dean says, "and I just want to do my little part."

Dear Kinfolks:

This is the first letter coming to you concerning the second DEAN & CREECH Reunion to be held July 3, 1976 at the Rowan County High School cafeteria in Morehead, starting at 10 a.m. Remember this is the Bi-Centennial year 1776-1976.

We hope all roads lead to Morehead for this reunion. Your ancestors lived here, walked on this soil, built roads, homes, made inventions and contributed to the advancement of this nation.

A few of the cemeteries here they were buried in are the ~~Brown, Mabry, Dean, Hays, Trough Camp, Enterprise, Callihan,~~ Garvin Ridge, Conley, New Sill, Forest Lawn, Pleasant Valley, Bowen Chapel, Grahn and several others.

Thomas Dean 1775 was among the 87 signing a petition to Virginia Convention to be governed by Virginia.

BROTHERS—Jimmy Dean, Jackson Dean and Clint Dean.

Jimmy Dean and Nancy Fields Dean lived on Armstrong farm at Trough Camp, foot of hill in Carter County.

Jimmy Dean and Nancy Fields Dean came from Scott County, Virginia around 1860 to Carter County. They traveled off road in day and boys drove team and rest stayed in wagon.

David Mocabee owned several hundred acres of land on Mocabee Creek in Carter County. He gave each child 160 acres. Mocabees came from Scotland.

Jonathan Kelly, Sr. was born in 1760 in Southwestern Virginia. Jonathan was probably the son of Lawrence Kelly.

The first Wynn that went into Harlan County from Lee County, Virginia, was Acles (Achilles) and he was the father of Josiah D. Wynn.

Jonathan Kelly, Sr. came across the Virginia mountains and settled at head of Bailey Creek in Harlan County.

John Dean of Harlan County influenced James Allen Creech and Rebecca Wynn Creech to leave Harlan County in 1904 and come to Elliott County and settle.

Paul Dean of Chicago and formerly of Hays Crossing has probably visited more foreign countries than any other Dean.

National Spelling Bee champion of 1950 in Atlanta, Georgia was Colquitt Dean. (Probably no immediate kin.)

Link Binion and husband of Mary Dean Binion and uncle of Otha Binion was killed by airplane propellar in early 1900's at Grahn, Ky. He was working for Mr. Sellars, National Aeronautics Director, in developing early flying machine. The Wright Brothers were successful and got the credit.

Bert Dean designed the two-seated pickup truck in 1950 but because of a dishonest attorney was beat out of the patent. Millions of them have been produced.

# Haldeman's centennial


The community of Haldeman will be celebrating its 100th birthday July 27-28 during the Hayes Crossing/Haldeman Community Reunion.

Even though bricks were produced several years before the post office was established in 1907, bricks up until 1907 carried the name Rowan on them. After 1907 the bricks carried the name Haldeman, after the name L.P. Haldeman, the owner.

Haldeman during the 1920s and 30s and 40s had a company store, clinic, girls' and boys' basketball teams, independent baseball team and an independent basketball team. There were ten-

nis courts, stores, a barber-shop, company houses and the brickyard under the leadership of Mr. Haldeman funds for the school system and community. At Christmas there were giveaways to children and Lloyd Dean still has a little iron tanker truck given by Mr. Haldeman.

Millions of bricks have been shipped all over the world from the two Haldeman Brickyards and during this time Haldeman was looked upon as the Society Community of Rowan County.





From there he helped pioneer night vision aviation and combat tactics while conducting classified missions around the world.

At the age of 25, Clark was the youngest ever selected to be instructor, then evaluator flight engineer in special operations. He flew all versions of the C-130 aircraft including the Combat Talon and the AC-130 Gun ship, a claim that only a few could make. Senior Master Sergeant Clark was also a participant in Desert Shield and Desert Storm.

Five years prior to his retirement he was selected as Air Force Special Operations Commands Chief Flight Engineer, where

he served until his retirement in November 1996. During his 22 years he earned three Meritorious Service Medals, four Air Force Accommodation medals, and 21 other decorations.

This event is under the direction of the American Legion Post 126, Rowan County Veterans Foundation, Inc. and the Rowan County Historical Society.

The first Flag Day ceremony in Morehead was held June 14, 1980 by Lloyd Dean. Dean got the idea while visiting his brother Vernon at Mt. Pleasant, Iowa. During his visit in 1970 he observed their Flag Day ceremony.

History of Hogtown as written by the following people:

### INTRODUCTION

We, the tenth grades of Elliottville High School are greatly indebted to the following for information concerning the history of Hogtown: Mrs. Arthur Hogge, Mr. and Mrs. Jim Adkins, Judge I. E. Pelfrey, Mr. ~~and~~ J. W. Thomas, Mr. Emerson Black, Mrs. Margarette Jones, Mrs. Curtis Lewis, Mr. W. Grant Jones, the late E. S. Montgomery who had written many articles concerning Hogtown in its earlier days, and Mrs. Susan Moore.

### HISTORY OF HOGTOWN

The first information that was collected on the history of Hogtown goes back to the year <sup>1870</sup>~~1870~~. At this time Squire Hogge began selling goods here; his was about the first store, and the town was called "Hogtown" in honor of him. About four years later there were two other stores, one of which was owned by Jenny Turner. Then Warren Alderson started a branch store which was run by an old man, H. D. Turner, and it was located near where D. A. Black's store is now. Bud Turner put up a store, and that year Charlie Ward, the first Post Master, was appointed. The office was a large, log house, in which goods were sold, too; it was near the site of Mr. Jim Adkins home. In 1875, Hogtown could boast of four stores.

Then Charlie Ward had the town incorporated under the name of Bristo. He was the town judge and the cases were tried by him in his sbroe. The town laws were made and tacked upon the trees. No stock was allowed to run loose, if any were caught they were put in a "stray pen" and the owner had to pay damage.

Else he could not get them out. About this time Eleck Fletcher and his son, Jerry, started the first steam grist mill." Mr. Fletcher had served shoats that were doing well on the corn that was spilled accidentally or otherwise at the mill." When he saw the laws on a tree in the forks of the branch, he immediately went to Mr. Ward and told him that if ever any of his pigs were put in a "stray pen" there'd be some "stray hell" in the town. This was one of the causes that made Ward not try to enforce the laws, and he did not succeed in getting it to be called anything except Hogtown until the post office came to be called Elliottville for the Elliotts, who were one of the first families in settling it.

The town was well supplied with saloons - there being three or four. This is a story told by J. W. Thomas, ~~Mr~~ Mr. Montgomery's personal letters.

There was a whiskey saloon in which drinks were sold. One night two men were there drinking. One "passed out", and his companion stabbed him nine times. Another fellow who was there crawled under the porch of the saloon for protection. Then the man who had done the stabbing took the drunk man by the feet and shook him thoroughly. Having come to his senses by now and fearing that his supposed to be friend would finish him, he pretended to be asleep and didn't answer. Therefore he escaped the possibilities of death.

Hogtown was not without a school, for probably as long ago as a hundred years a one-room school building was erected on the hill near Marvin E. Adkins'. The earth served as a floor, and long benches to sit upon were made from logs. Mrs. Elizabeth Turner, Judge M. M. Redwine of Sandy Hook, Mr. M. F. Fouch, and

Dr. H. L. Wilson's mother were some of the first teachers. This was torn down, and a one room school with a storm hall and two cloak rooms, one for the girls and one for the boys, was erected near the highway on the other side of the road.

Some of the teachers who taught in this building prior to 1929 were Mr. I. E. Pelfrey, Mr. Orville Carter, and Marie Lewis Adkins, all three residents of Elliottville at the present, <sup>also</sup> Mary Hogge, and Huston Johnson.

In the year of 1929, Mrs. Lyda Messer Caudill, Superintendent of Rowan County Schools, and Mr. C. B. Turner, a member of the Board of Education, together with others, succeeded in getting a High School at Hogtown.

In order to take care of the students, another room was added to the building before the school began. There was still a need for an extra room as three teachers, Mrs. Pearl Brown Mrs. Ed Williams, and Mr. John Bailey, principal were hired to teach.

In spite of the difficulties, the school began as was planned with Mr. Bailey taking the high school group to an old vacant store building in the center of the village. In the meantime another room was being built. No one tried harder than the principal Mr. Bailey, to make the school a success. He was an indefatigable worker. Often after school and on Saturdays and Sundays he would walk an ride miles out into the country gathering boys and girls who he thought should be in school. Many times he had to persuade the parnts to let the child, who had ben out of school for a few years, return. Soon he had enough students to meet the requirements for high school. He still continued to do many things to incourage boys and girls to Hogtown. Often he


bought books for those who were unable to buy for themselves. Everyone who knew Mr. Bailey realizes the part he played in making the school a success during the three years he was principal.

In 1932, a <sup>partition</sup> petition was built in the original building and an extra room was built on the other side. Then four teachers were employed: John Bailey, Mabel Hackney, Irene Turner, and Beulah Williams. In 1934, Grace Lewis was added to the faculty, and John Caudill became principal. A year later the County Board purchased a small residence back of the school, remodeled it and hired Mrs. Bill Layne and Orville Carter, new teachers, and moved the primary grades farther up the hill.

Thelma Allen replaced John Caudill as principal in 1937. Then in 1938 these changes came: Mr. Ted Crosthwaite became principal, Mrs. Arthur Hogge, Bernice Lewis, and Mae Carter were the new members of the faculty. Both Sand Gap and Open Fork were consolidated with Elliottville. The new stone building began in 1937 with the assistance of the WPA, was about completed, so the teachers and pupils moved into it. In 1939, Bradley schoolhouse washed away, and in order to take care of the students, the Board and Supt. decided to move the children to Hogtown. Bessie Mae Birchfield who had already been hired to teach Bradley School came to. This made a total of seven teachers with an enrollment of (225). The school as well as the village was rapidly growing. The new gymnasium will be finished soon, and a group of patrons are working with Mr. Crosthwaite trying to get rural electrification. The hope is that this will be accomplished before the opening of school in September. The yard is being graded and landscaped with the assistance of the NYA.

We feel that no other school in the county has surpassed it in growth in so short a period. The two Board members from this district I. E. Pelfrey and Claude Turner, together with the former Supt. Lyda Messer Caudill and the present Superintendent, Roy Cornette and the other Board Members and work very diligently; the patrons and pupils recognize and appreciate their untiring efforts.




## *National Child's Day*



## I REMEMBER MA DEAN

Zoan Thomas Dean was born in 1879 to Jim Ambers Thomas and Nancy Mocabee Thomas--I called her Ma because that is what my dad called her. She and pap moved to Hays Branch around 1913 from Carter County. She was an industrious person who knew what hard times were. She wasn't afraid of hard work and provided well for her household. She took pride in her garden and would can and preserve what she could for the winter months. The home was furnished with simple furniture but she kept it neat and clean as possible. I remember helping her set out a cedar tree in the yard when I was about nine years old. I remember she would pick gooseberries, pie plant, and gather what apples that grew on the trees. It was over a wood stove in the kitchen that she cooked the daily meals. I enjoyed eating with Ma and Pap. The wood box sat on the back porch and if no one was around she would fill it herself. I enjoyed helping gather the duck eggs and carrying them in. Once in a while my brother, Vernon and I would stay all night with her and Pap. We got to sleep upstairs on the featherbed where it was warm. She would pick the ducks for the feathers to use in pillows and featherbed. Even the day before her death, my dad, brother and I visited her. I remember she encouraged us to do good in school. December 21, 1941 at approximately 6:30 a.m. she passed away. I remember my dad was milking and Brian Brown who stayed with them brought us the news. Brian stayed with my brother and I, and Mom and Dad went down to the house immediately. There was a deep snow on at this time of year. Ma will always be remembered in the hearts of those who knew her.

In October of 2012, Tanner Utterback, grandson of Vernon and Rosella May formerly of May hollow was awarded the American Farmer FFA Degree in Indianapolis, Indiana. This was amazing because of roots from the same hollow.

1. The families who have lived here are and were the families of MAY, DEAN, CREECH, GEE, SPARKS, STIGALL, AMBURGEY, PARKER, CONN, HALL, BLEVINS AND LYONS, plus the PUCKETT family.
2. Stores located in the hollow were the MAY GENERAL STORE, DEAN GENERAL STORE AND STIGALL GENERAL STORE.
3. Employment consisted of FARMING, CLAY MINES, BRICK YARD AND STATE HIGHWAY.
4. Military service was in WORLD WAR II, and KOREAN CONFLICT, plus LATER TIMES. BRANCHES WERE AIR FORCE, ARMY and NAVY.
5. Schools attended were the LITTLE PERRY SCHOOL (HAD TO WALK ACROSS THE HILL OR GO DOWN THE CREEK BAR).
6. DEMOCRATS AND REPUBLICANS LIVED IN THE HOLLOW.
7. Type of animals raised were HOGS, COWS, MULES, HORSES, CHICKENS AND CATS AND DOGS.
8. Road was dirt road for many years but last several years was paved so people could get out of the mud.
9. Majority of trees were HICKORY, WALNUT, OAK, PINE, FRUIT TREES, and SASSAFRASS TREES.
10. Church affiliation was CHURCH OF GOD, BAPTIST AND PENTECOSTAL.
11. A PENTECOSTAL CHURCH WAS LOCATED AT THE MOUTH OF THE HOLLOW ON U.S. 60.
12. One person was in the CCCs (CIVILIAN CONSERVATION CORE).
13. Cemeteries are MAY and VIARS (located on point of first hill on right going up Hollow with approximately 4 graves)
14. The people of the hollow were close knit, like family and helped each other in sickness, farming and other activities.
15. Blackberries, Hazelnuts and Huckleberries were in the hollow.
16. Vehicles owned were mostly used cars and trucks which was in need of repair which everyone worked on their own. (One wreck that I know coming out of the hollow.)

"Most of the activities will take place inside with some outside in tents if it doesn't rain," Dean said.


A parade from Little Perry Road to the school will begin festivities Saturday at 10 a.m.



# 'When the Railroad Leaves Town'...

Local historian  
contributes to book  
about trains leaving

Lloyd Dean remembers all too well the whistle of the old C&O Railroad train, as a resident of Haldeman, where the train rumbled through routinely.

"We used to get on the train at Haldeman and ride it to Lawton store for a dime, and

through the Morehead area.

That's why he was called upon by author Joseph P. Schwieterman to contribute to a history of the rail. Schwieterman, a Ph.D. at DePaul University, recently published the book, entitled: "When the Railroad Leaves Town - American Communities in the Age of Rail Line Abandonment."

Morehead is the only Kentucky town featured in the 350-page book, possibly because Dean has been so attentive at keeping a detailed description of Morehead's railroad history, and was able to share that knowledge with Schwieterman.

The book describes 65 railroads that have been closed east of the Mississippi.

"Fifty to a hundred years from now, we might not even be able to find the lines, and



this book will make it easier to locate them," Dean said.

Dean's nostalgia for the railroad includes a practical point-of-view.

"I hated to see the train leave and I wish they hadn't taken it out," he said. "With the way things look now, if the airline industry goes down, we won't have any alternative form of transportation other than cars, and driving more cars makes the roads more dangerous."

In their day, trains opened up the world, especially for eastern dwellers who wished to see the west.

"When I was stationed in California with the air force, my wife and I would get on the train in Morehead, change in Louisville, change again in Chicago and we were on our way," Dean said.

Dean has always loved the

mid-1950s, Kentucky's railroads were losing customers in droves. When (Rowan) county celebrated its centennial in 1956, the *Rowan County News* carried an article heralding the George Washington as a train that offered 'every convenience' for

travelers.

"Still, it was a cruel historical irony that the paper printed such flattering words opposite an advertisement for new Packard Clippers - one of the many popular motor cars eroding the train's market niche..."

walk from there to Elliott County," Dean said.

When President Harry Truman came to Morehead by train during a whistle stop campaign tour, Morehead High School students were excused for the day. Dean was one of those students. He walked to the depot and got to see the president from about 20 feet away.

As train rides and whistle stops don't exist anymore, Dean has been able to record much about the trains that have run

stories he was told by his grandfather, who worked on the railroad balancing rails and working on cross ties.

His uncle, Otha Binion, 97, still tells the story of riding the C&O one day as it went through the tunnel at Haldeman. Binion recalls the crisp, white shirt he was wearing that day. At the other side of the tunnel, he looked down and was surprised to be covered in black soot.

"I laugh every time he tells about that," Dean said.

Dean said he has seen trains go through with hoboes riding on top of them and he "always heard the whistles, you could set your clock by the stops."

Beginning on page 94 of the book, Morehead is featured for four pages, complete with photographs and a map.



## Tracing Your Family History *Suggestions for Beginners*

In order to trace your family history, you need first to question the older members of your family. Encourage them to talk about their childhood and their relatives. Use a tape recorder if possible. Make notes and follow up on everything that hints of a family connection. Fill out a family chart as completely as possible for each of your parents.

After you have heard all the "facts," you must verify them from other sources. Visit your local library and inquire what historical and genealogical information is available, and consult those that relate to the geographic area of your interest. You should know something about the geographic area and history of the county or town in order to know what you can expect to find.

You will also need to ask the librarian how to use the library, what sources are available, if there are genealogy classes offered in the area, and for names and addresses of historical or genealogical societies. Find out if there are patriotic or other societies for which there are proven lineage membership requirements, such as the Daughters/ Sons of the American Revolution. Most important, learn to ask the right questions.

Your next visit will be to the local courthouse to find out what is there. Be sure to ask about the will, deed, and marriage books, and how they are recorded. Look for genealogical clues that mention the surnames you are interested in. Check all conceivable variant spellings. Make notes on all data and be sure to cite your sources. Wills often give names of the spouse and children. Deeds sometimes mention spouse and children or brothers and sisters. Marriage records often mention a bondsman, who is frequently a family member. If the couple was under age it will usually list a parent or guardian.

When birth and death records are not available, Bible records or tombstone inscriptions can provide vital information. Church records should also be checked for birth and death information.

Record all your findings systematically, indicating the source for each fact. Use printed family group sheets and pedigree charts. Create and organize a filing system so that you can locate what you have.

The Kentucky Historical Society does not have the staff to do extensive research. Our records are open to the public six days a week: Tuesday through Saturday, 8:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M., and Sunday, 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M., except some state holidays. Please check our Web site concerning holiday hours. Staff is always available for help and direction.

## HALDEMAN--HAYS CROSSING COMMUNITIES

filed from a history of the community written by Lloyd Dean in 1953

There are several neighborhoods in the Haldeman--Hays Crossing area. Earliest Haldeman history dates back to 1779 when all of Kentucky was a part of Virginia. Early settlers were Bells, Christians, Cunninghams, Powers, Thomas, Richards, Hays and Cornette. Others who came later were families by name of Sparks, Stinsons, Bowens, Sturgill, Dean, Rice, Cox, Click, Hortons, Kegleys, Stevens, Pelfery, Mabry, Lyons, Fultz, Bailey, Haldeman, Conley, Stewart, Hall, Turners, Wilson, Eldridge, Kitchen, Clark, Reeder, Oney, and others. During middle 1800s Richards were scattered in the community and they are buried in little cemetery at Hays Crossing.

John Wesley Hays who was a civil war veteren came to Haldeman from Letcher County around 1850. He purchased land from the Richards family a track from Buffalo to Gates. This land was rich in clay. These veins were mined for years, first by the Louisville and Portsmouth FireBrick Company before Kentucky Fire Brick took over.

The C & O Railroad ran through the community with stops at Gates, Hays Crossing and Haldeman. Before 1880 Hays Crossing was known as Highland Point, and was a switch point for C & O Railroad freight trains as well as a regular stop. After the Hays family was established in the community it took the name of Hays Crossing.

In the late 1880s Mr. W.A. Conley, a dry goods salesman operating from Portsmouth to Morehead and traveling through the country, by covered wagon to peddle his goods, bought land rich in clay veins in the community. He formed a partnership with the Louisville Company which constructed a brickyard.

The Haldeman High School had a modern gym, equipped with bleachers stage and electric scoreboard, a spacious stage with a new set of curtains, costing \$900.00 provided by the P.T.A. The school was known throughout Eastern Kentucky for outstanding athletes.


There were three seperate school buildings in the community, Haldeman High, Haldeman Grade and Little Perry. Haldeman schools had approximately 350 students and Little Perry, twenty-eight.

In the early 40s one of the brick yards closed and the company sold out to the General Refractories. Employment dropped from 300 to 85. In 1945 the Eleventh and Twelfth grades at Haldeman were transferred to Morehead High.

Other families in community are Messer, Hicks, Binion, Creech, Adkins, Cartee, Miller, Parker, Blevins, May, Barker, Puckett, Fraley, Howard, Plank, Cline, Caudill, Amburgey, Roberts, Johnson, Fultz and others.



Most people today are trying to figure out how to save on expenses.

We have lived here 42 years and have bought very little fertilizer during this time. Those in gardening this Spring and Summer should start using Compost if at all possible. Grass clippings coffee grounds, egg shells, potato scraps, leaves and any other natural materials that will decompose and rot up. By doing this you will build a good rich loam soil that has all the nutrients to produce a good crop.

If your soil is of poor quality you may not notice that much an improvement the first year but ~~it~~ will certainly improve soil quality as time goes on and you keep using this method.

We are losing many thousands of <sup>acres of</sup> our good farm land to housing developments, parking lots, highways and urban sprawl. We have to learn how to make fewer acres produce more, and it can be done.

Also we never use sprays on the plants because I dont want the plant roots picking up poisons that will find its way into the vegetables produced.

These two ideas is just a suggestion on how you can save a few dollars this summer. Have a good growing season starting now and in the future.

## History of the Kentucky District News

PRESBYTER, SECTION N  
REV. LLOYD DEAN



Greetings to everyone in Jesus Name! We bring you greetings from Section N.

I have chosen to write for March and for your information the history of the **Kentucky District News** of the United Pentecostal Church. As you notice the **Kentucky District News** is now in Volume 28 and Number 3. The Lord dealt with me thirty years ago to start a paper for the Kentucky District. I was in the United Pentecostal Church, Riverside, CA, where Bro. Mark Baughman was pastor while I was in the Air Force. I had read the **California District News** and wondered how to get a Kentucky paper. Bro. Baughman gave me Bro. T.F. Moore's address in Russellville, KY., where he was pastor of the Russellville U.P.C., and serving as District Superintendent. I wrote Bro. Moore and asked him to send me a paper for I planned to return to Kentucky after my discharge. He answered my letter and informed me that Kentucky did not have a paper but he and the Board would appreciate it if I would like to get one started.

When I returned to Kentucky in January of 1957 the District Conference voted me in as Sunday School Director to take the place of Farrell Forest who had resigned and left for California. (This was unusual as I had just returned from California and Bro. Forest was going there.) I first started the paper as a part of the Sunday School Department with the name **Kentucky Sunday School News**, the next month we changed the name to **Apostolic News of Kentucky** and then to the **Kentucky District News** the next month.

I typed the first issue on a stencil and the Commerce Department of Morehead High School ran it off.

In August of 1959 Sister Dean and I moved to Felicity, Ohio where I taught school and served as the first high school Counselor there. I kept my parents' mailing address for the **District News**, Mr. & Mrs. Bert Dean, Rt. 2, Box 523, Morehead, KY., until we moved back in June of 1963. We bought a mimeograph machine and I typed the stencils, ran them off and Sister Dean helped get them ready for mailing. We mailed them in Morehead. We moved back to Grayson,

KY., in 1963 and I still kept the Morehead address. At this time we got East Kentucky Printing to print the **Kentucky District News** in a 5 by 7 format. Practically all churches ordered the **News**. I became District Secretary and Treasurer in the year of 1969 and kept the **District News** until January of 1970 at which time I resigned, making a total of thirteen years serving as editor.

Let me say that I personally feel the **Kentucky District News** of the Kentucky District has great potential for future outstanding service to this District.

We ask all Pentecostals everywhere in the District to get behind Sis. Linda Leach and help make this **Kentucky District News** one of the best in the nation.

Greetings to everyone in Jesus Name! We bring you greetings from Section N.

I have chosen to write for March and for your information the history of the **Kentucky District News** of the United Pentecostal Church. As you notice the **Kentucky District News** is now in Volume 28 and Number 3. The Lord dealt with me thirty years ago to start a paper for the Kentucky District. I was in the United Pentecostal Church, Riverside, CA, where Bro. Mark Baughman was pastor while I was in the Air Force. I had read the **California District News** and wondered how to get a Kentucky paper. Bro. Baughman gave me Bro. T.F. Moore's address in Russellville, KY., where he was pastor of the Russellville U.P.C., and serving as District Superintendent. I wrote Bro. Moore and asked him to send me a paper for I planned to return to Kentucky after my discharge. He answered my letter and informed me that Kentucky did not have a paper but he and the Board would appreciate it if I would like to get one started.

When I returned to Kentucky in January of 1957 the District Conference voted me in as Sunday School Director to take the place of Farrell Forest who had resigned and left for California. (This was unusual as I had just returned from California and Bro. Forest was going there.) I first started the paper as a part of the Sunday School Department with the name **Kentucky Sunday School News**, the next month we changed the name to **Apostolic News of Kentucky** and then to the **Kentucky District News** the next month.

I typed the first issue on a stencil and the Commerce Department of Morehead High School ran it off.

In August of 1959 Sister Dean and I moved to Felicity, Ohio where I taught school and served as the first high school Counselor there. I kept my parents' mailing address for the **District News**, Mr. & Mrs. Bert Dean, Rt. 2, Box 523, Morehead, KY., until we moved back in June of 1963. We bought a mimeograph machine and I typed the stencils, ran them off and Sister Dean helped get them ready for mailing. We mailed them in Morehead. We moved back to Grayson,

KY., in 1963 and I still kept the Morehead address. At this time we got East Kentucky Printing to print the **Kentucky District News** in a 5 by 7 format. Practically all churches ordered the **News**. I became District Secretary and Treasurer in the year of 1969 and kept the **District News** until January of 1970 at which time I resigned, making a total of thirteen years serving as editor.

Let me say that I personally feel the **Kentucky District News** of the Kentucky District has great potential for future outstanding service to this District.

We ask all Pentecostals everywhere in the District to get behind Sis. Linda Leach and help make this **Kentucky District News** one of the best in the nation.
