Noted your request for information about several persons including Hays. See page 11, Car-Del Scribe Vol 21 No 4, July 1984.

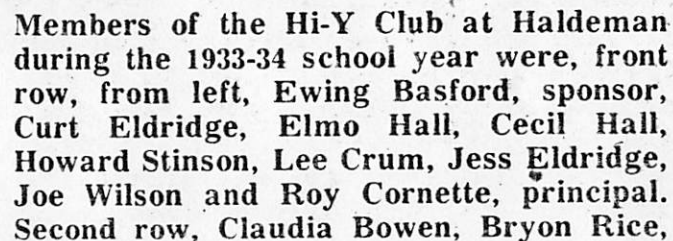

Reflections . . .

It is always a delight to report that another family history has been compiled and published by someone dedicated enough to care. The Hayes Family of Lawrence County, Kentucky, by Mary Eva Berry Repass, just released, promises to fill one more niche in the narrowing gap of available local genealogical data.

Nothing is more exciting than to quench one's curiosity about his ancestral beginnings and to share with other interested persons the results of the extensive research involved in such a quest. Each member of a family who supplies information of his own to the compiler secures the satisfaction of knowing he has helped to preserve the history of his branch from the relative anonymity that comes with the passage of time.

The progenitor of the Hayes family in Eastern Kentucky was Bazeal Hayes (1806-1889), whose father is named as Isaac on Bazeal's marriage record. The author believes, however, that Isaac may have been his stepfather and that Bazeal's real surname may have been Hohimer.

Bazeal married twice, became the father of 27 children to help populate the valleys and hollows of Lawrence County. Many of his descendants have now drifted to surrounding areas and throughout the nation.

Eva Berry Repass, the author, now lives at Fredericksburg, Va., although her mother, Pearlleen Berry, still lives in Louisa where she owns the Fine Arts Shop across from the post office.

Bazeal Hayes married Sarah Ann Pack (b. 1806), daughter of Elizabeth Pack, on Sept. 22, 1825. She bore him 13 children before her death in 1849 or 1850. For his second wife, Bazeal married Ardella Bowling (b. 1835) on April 15, 1850, when she was only 14 years old and he was 43. This vast age difference accounts for the great number of children he was able to father, the youngest being 51 years younger than the eldest. Ardella bore him 14 children.

William Pack Hayes (b. 1826) was the first child born to Bazeal and Sarah Ann. He was also married twice, to Elizabeth Murray and Margaret Carter and had four children by the first wife and eight by the second. They lived at Adams, Ky. Some of William's offspring married into the Adams, Dean, Berry, Gussler, Ramey, McCormack, Carter and Evans families.

Here we find the ancestors of our local Gussler family, although Ova L. Gussler, the Ashland land developer and home builder, says that the author has omitted his parents, Sterling and Fannie Fraley Gussler, and has him listed as the child of his grandparents, Bill and Julia Ann Hayes Gussler.

Bazeal and Sarah's second child was Elizabeth Hayes who married James

became mother of Thelma Walter (author of *The Chandler Family*) and her brothers who own Chandler's Plywood Co. in Huntington. Thelma's sons, Lafayette, John Paul, Grady, Jack, Richard and Theodore are well-known in this area. Ted is now a Lexington attorney. Their sister Norida married Bob Herbst Nipp.

Bazeal Hayes' second family began with two infants who died unnamed and the third, Anjaline (b. 1854) also died young. The other 11 that Ardella had were: Archabald (b. 1855, m. Melinda L. E. Preston), Milton (b. 1858, m. Jane Cordle), Calista (b. 1860, m. Dan J. Thompson), Martin (b. 1863, m. Mary McKinster), Walter (b. 1865, m. Sarah F. Daniels), Mathew (b. 1865, twin to Walter, m. Julie McKinster), Dixie Trinvill (b. 1867, m. John W. Perry and Linzie Wellman), L.H.M. (listed in the family Bible as "A failure," probably a miscarriage), Elijah (b. 1871, m. Dora Murray), Harden (b. 1874, m. Della Miller) and Martha Alice Hayes (b. 1877, lived only 7 months).

Those children supplied Bazeal and Ardella with 66 grandchildren, making a total of 165 for Bazeal. Much Lawrence County land passed through his hands during his lifetime and he conveyed a tract to each of his children to ensure that all of these grandchildren would have a home. So many area surnames are included in this book it would be impossible to name them all in this column.

Not much is given on this branch of the family, except their spouses and Marion and Emma Dixon Hayes' offspring.

The remainder of Bazeal and Sarah Ann Pack Hayes' children were: Isaac (b. 1829, m. Catherine Vanhooze), Julia Ann (b. 1831, m. John R. "Rob" Spencer), John (b. 1832, m. Elizabeth Thompson), Della (b. 1835, m. Green Travis), Fanny (b. 1837, m. Hiram Jordan), Mary Ann (b. 1838, m. Moses Vanhooze), Bazeal Jr. (b. 1840), Sarah Ann (b. 1843, m. Martin Dixon), Allen (b. 1845, m. Julie Carter), Andrew (b. 1847, m. Louise Moore) and Marion Hayes (b. 1849, d. young). From these offspring Bazeal and Sarah became grandparents to 99 children, all named in the book.

Sarah Ann and Mart Dixon were the ancestors of some of our local Ashland families; their descendants married into the Perry, France, Daniels, Justice, Cordle, Castle, Cheatum, Preston, Chapman, Kazee, Cash, Lyons, Young, Akers, Cremeans and Cyrus families. After Sarah Ann's death Mart married Mary Sparks and had two daughters, Martha and Laura Dixon. Sarah gave birth to 11 children.

Andrew Hayes (son of Bazeal and Sarah) and Louise Moore were ancestors of some of our Ashland Hayeses. Their son Green Hayes married Bertha Chandler in 1900 and they are the parents of Olive (Johnson), Herman Hayes, Ola Faye (Benjamin), James Albert Hayes, Donald Edwin Hayes and Wilma Jean (Blevins).

Stroke Fatal To Mrs. Elizabeth Maggard, 75

Prominent Morehead Woman Is Survived By Her Daughter

Death came suddenly Thursday to one of Morehead's best known women, Mrs. E. E. (Elizabeth Hayes) Maggard.

Mrs. Maggard became suddenly ill and suffered a partial stroke at her home on Main Street. She died a few hours after being rushed to St. Joseph Hospital, Lexington.

Mrs. Maggard, daughter of the late John and Frances Cornett Hayes, was born in Rowan County and lived her entire life at Morehead. She was 75 years of age.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday at the Morehead Christian Church, of which she was a member, by Reverends Miller Dungan, Buell H. Kazee and J. C. Raikes. Interment was in Brown Cemetery.

Her husband, E. E. Maggard, prominent Morehead business leader, died in 1948. He had considerable business holdings and property, most of which he disposed of the year before his death. Mr. Maggard retained only that property which covers more than a half city block on Main and Second Streets of which the Maggard residence is a part.

Mrs. Maggard had been in apparent good health and was particularly known for her jolly greetings to every passerby. She knew almost everybody in Morehead by their first name.

Besides her church affiliation Mrs. Maggard was an active member of the Eastern Star and civic organizations.

Only immediate survivors is her daughter, Hildreth.

A tryout camp for baseball players will be conducted by the Cincinnati Reds on Friday, June 12 in Lexington at the University of Kentucky Baseball Field. The camp is open to all boys from 16 to 22 years of age. High School sophomores and juniors are especially urged to attend.

Reds scouting supervisor Gene Bennett will be in charge of the workouts, which are scheduled to start promptly at 10. Registration will begin at 9 and all players participating in the workouts must be registered prior to the 10 starting time.

Bennett will be assisted by Reds scouts Fred Hayes, Jack Bick, Leroy Jackson, Don Moyer, Steve Kring, Joe Seavers and Bob Flynn.

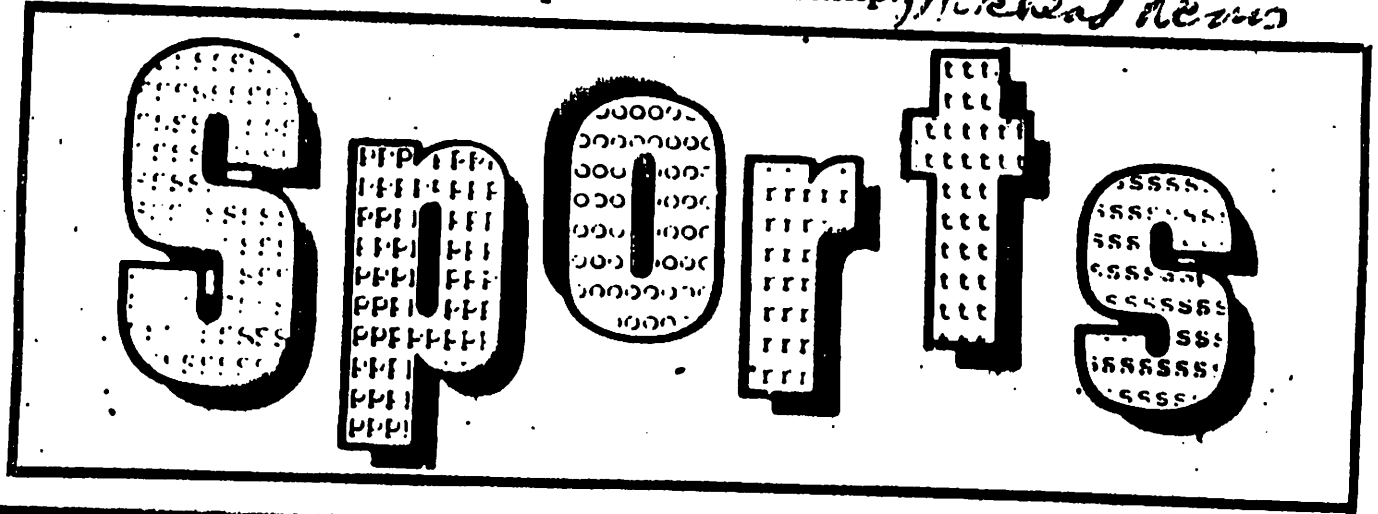
All eligible players are requested

Dear Lloyd Dean,

The Eastern Kentucky Genealogical Society just got around to sending me the July 1992 "Tree Shaker", in which I saw your query. I'd like to know whether the Wesley Hayes you are working on is the same Wesley Griffy Hays who disappeared from my family sometime after the census of 1850. Wesley Hays was enumerated in the household of John Hays, Floyd Co., KY, in 1850, but it is now apparent that he was not a son of John and Elizabeth (Anderson) Hays. He was a bound boy, a son of Derinda Conley and born abt Sep 1837, but it is not now certain which Hays may have been his father. His apprenticeship to John Hays would have ended in 1858.

I look forward to hearing from you and hope that we can help each other.


Dear Lloyd Dean,

I found Wesley Hays in the Census of Rowan Co., KY, 1860, 1880, 1900, and 1910. The ages he gave were consistent with birth in Sep 1837. Wesley Hayes consistently gave KY as birthplace for both his parents; if he knew correctly, this suggests that a son of John Hays and Elizabeth Anderson was his father. **Neither Wesley nor Frances Hays has been found in the 1920 Census, suggesting that they died 1910-1920. Do you know the maiden name of Frances Hays?**

Do you know when Wesley Hays died? Have you ever seen his death certificate which would give the names of his parents? Are you a descendant of one of his children? In the censuses 10 children were named: John H., Arthneal E. (?), Andrew J., Nancy B., James R., William, Robert D., Louisa T., Wesley B., and Elizabeth M. In 1900 Frances Hayes declared herself mother of 10, 10 living; two grandchildren resided with her, Mary, 15, and Vinton, 12. It's interesting that in 1910 five unmarried, adult children 33 years (W. B.) to 48 years (Drew) were living with their aged parents.

I am interested in this family, since I feel that they are related to mine. Any additions or corrections will be appreciated
