ISON GENEALOGY

Archibald Ison, born about the year of 1780, was a farmer. He settled in a section of Morgan County. There, he married Mary Gilliam. Archibald's wife, Mary, gave birth to ten children, (nine sons and one daughter). The children were named: Isaac, Charles, Ira, William, Martin, Doctor, Byrdine, Argalus, Isom and Elizabeth.

In 1869, Elliott County was established. The portion which Archibald lived was included in part of the establishment of the new county.

Archibald died in 1871, only two years after Elliott County had been formed. He was buried in the family cemetery at Isonville.

The fifth child of Archibald, Martin Ison, was born between the years of 1812 and 1815. In 1829, Martin married Nancy Sparks. Nancy was born in 1810.

Nancy gave birth to eight children, (six sons and two daughters). Their names were as follows: Charles, William, Joshua, Byrdine, Reuben, Martin Jr., Sidney and Nancy.

Martin and Nancy's third child, Joshua, was born May 20, 1833. Martin married Mary Gilliam. Joshua and Mary had eight children. Their names were; Ike, Milton (Milt), Rufus, Ellen, Reuben, Isom, Isaac (Iser) and Robert (Bob).

Joshua died May 11, 1882. He was

buried in the old Ison cemetery creek.

Joshua and Mary's son, Isom, February 14, 1872. Mollie Ison, the woman he married, was born January 1876. They lived on Isoncreek.

Isom ran a grist mill by steam and farmed, raised hogs and sheep.

Isom and Mollie had seven children. They were named; Frank, Clarence, Floyd, Iva, Bert, and Edna.

Isom died November 14, 1941. He died October 3, 1953. Both were buried in the Ison Cemetery on the Ison farm.

The second child of Isom and Mollie was Orville. He was born November 1904 at Charity on Isoncreek. Audrey Lewis, born April 29, 1904, became Orville's wife May 10, 1925 at Brumley. Maggard performed the ceremony. Orville was a carpenter.

Orville and Audrey raised seven children. Their names are; Orville, Ishmeal, Raymond, Phillip, Ruben, and Sharon.

Orville died February 25, 1979. He was buried in the Memorial Gardens at Hook. Audrey is still living. She lives on the old Isom Ison farm at Isoncreek.

The fourth son of Orville and Audrey was Phillip Ison. He was born August 1938, became Phillip's wife January 1959. Judge June Davis performed the ceremony at Sandy Hook. Phillip lives on the left fork of Isoncreek.

Wilma gave birth to four children. Their names were; Delora, Delena, Zanetta, and Phillip Jr.

I am the third child of Phillip and Audrey Ison; Zanetta, born March 28, 1938, Morehead. I graduated from Elliott County High School in 1983. I am currently employed with The Peoples Bank at Sandy Hook.

This is the genealogy of my Ison family (from Archibald to, my brother, Isom Jr.), seven generations, 200 years.

Family tradition has it that James Harve's family and Betty's family were at the "Salt Licks" getting salt to cure their meat when he saw her at a distance. He thought she was the "prettiest little thing" he'd ever seen with "coal black hair" and beautiful eyes. Supposedly, he made up his mind then and there to make her his bride. In a short time, he did. They lived on Elk Fork where Great Grandpa had quite a bit of land, some say 1000 acres plus. He belonged to the Masons and was very active and proud of the organization. His tombstone reflects that James Harve always kept foxhounds and loved to run them. People have told me that he always rode a big, black stallion and would travel from place to place, riding him, to breed mares. If he happened to imbibe, the story goes that he could lie down anywhere and his stallion would never leave his side, tied or not.

Great grandpa apprenticed in a leather shop in Wilmington, NC, for about 10 years, where he learned to make shoes. The Hutchinson saddle, of course, is still known of in Eastern KY, and according to my mother, anyone who rode knew immediately if they were on a Hutchinson saddle. She said people came from all over to buy them.

Elizabeth "Betty" Mason Hutchinson, b 13 Nov 1837, was the daughter of Thomas Jefferson Mason and Susan Green White. Her grandparents were James Mason and Sally Todd, and James Green, Jr. and Delcena Stallard. From all accounts, she must have been a wonderful woman and very much in love with her husband. While great grandpa was in the Civil War, she kept the farm going and worked from sunup to sundown. It has been said that great grandpa's "Union" suit was still in the old house when it was torn down. Great grandma Betty couldn't stand to part with it.

When Morgan's Raiders came through Elk Fork during the turbulent times after the Civil War, they stopped at James Harve and Betty's taking their horses and anything else they could. They took great grandpa and his beloved stallion with one of his "trained" dogs following behind. Harve had taught this dog to take the horse's bridle in his mouth and lead the horse. Family tradition has it that James Harve was tied to a tree

while Morgan's Raiders were around a campfire eating and drinking. Sometime during the night, James Harve worked the ropes loose, signaled his dog that went and got his horse, slipped away in the late night hours because he was certain they would end up killing him when they found out which side of the war he had been on. Until the day great grandma Betty died, people knew to never mistreat a dog in her presence. It has even been said she would get on you if you tried to run one off a porch.

My mother always said Uncle Trav was the best looking man she had ever seen and evidently great aunt Sues thought so too. He was fifteen years older and her teacher. Family tradition tells of how they had to sneak to see each other and leave letters in the hollow of an old tree. Aunt Sues was a very pretty young woman and their wedding photo shows a very striking couple with

five children. On 24 Nov 1907, Travis Barker's arm was amputated and once it was healed, he went right on working. Great aunt Sues and Uncle Trav had a short marriage with him dying 3 Sep 1919. Aunt Sues had nineteen years with the man she loved, but they were enough to last a lifetime.

Great grandma Betty smoked a corn cob pipe right up until she died. She lived to be the oldest woman in Elliott Co. at the time of her death, 29 Aug 1936. I can remember many years ago seeing a newspaper clipping at my grandma's telling of her death. Martha Hutchinson Wright was seventy-seven years old when I was born and she was the only grandparent I ever knew. Many weeks we made daily trips to Middle Fork to feed her chickens so she wouldn't have to get rid of them. My dad was always doing something special for her. Some of my fondest memories are of quiet times in her "lower room" when she would tell of the past and show me letters tied in ribbons with old, old stamps on them since I was into collecting stamps. Also, she had several tinprints and she would tell me each name and something about each person. I just simply thought she would always be around so I did not write any of it down and today I truly regret it. She always had candy hidden in her dresser drawers and if almost out, would let me walk up to Wilson Skaggs' store for a nickel's worth of candy. Wilson always filled my "poke" to overflowing. Grandma wasn't a very big woman, hard of hearing, thin hair, and little tiny black rimmed glasses. She wore long print dresses that my mom usually made her and typical "Granny" shoes. She had a black snake in her cellar that she wouldn't let anyone bother so most of the time she had to make her own trips to get the stored food. I still remember vividly her falling on ice at Wilson Skaggs' and later, it was learned that she had broken her hip. She stayed with us for some time in our front bedroom and I would sit on a cane bottom chair by her bed and talk. I don't remember her complaining but Mom always said Ma was in horrible pain. I told Grandma that when I got big, I was going to help people like her. At the time I was thinking of being a doctor. Aunt Sabrie and Uncle Roy were just right across the road and it was made up that if we needed help or something was wrong we would put a white sheet across the porch bannisters. After some debate, Grandma was taken to Huntington by ambulance and later, moved to the farm where we took turns taking care of her. On occasions she would talk of "Pap" or something that had happened long ago; however, it was as if she knew she didn't have long. She wanted to die at home and did not want to be embalmed. Both wishes were honored. On 7 Apr 1955, Grandma drew her last breath and I had my first experience with a human death and deep, profound, heartrending grief. As my mother aged, she looked so much like Grandma, acted like her, walked like her, and now, I am discovering that I am becoming like them, especially attitude and old fashioned values. The older I get, the smarter they become.

Many Hutchinsons still live in Elliott and Morgan Counties but most of us have moved other places for one reason or another. Regardless, we are bonded for eternity. And, to the memory of Edna Barker Hutchinson Offenbacher, this story is dedicated. She and I shared a love for our Hutchinson history, families, traditions and Kentucky. Submitted by: Sue H. ARCHIBALD ISON

Archibald Ison (ca 1780 - 22 Feb 1855) came to eastern KY in the early 1800s. He appeared in the 1810 Clay Co. KY Census as Arch Isham and the 1820 Floyd Co. Census. He migrated from Scott Co. VA and many of his family remained there, including his parents, Charles and Elizabeth Ison.

Archibald married Mary Gilliam about 1800.

Dale Dickerson; (2) John Claude Williams who married Betty Stewart. They have two daughters Mary Nikole Williams and Jennie Leigh Williams. Both families reside in Elliott County.

After the Civil War, Sylvester was married, a farmer and a father when he decided to study medicine. He graduated from Louisville Medical College in 1889, and practiced medicine in Elliott County until about 1920. His son, Charles Randolph Hunter, graduated from University of Louisville Medical School in 1917. After serving in the army, he joined his father and practiced medicine in Elliott County until his father's death in 1923. Randolph then moved to Ashland, KY for a few years, but returned to Sandy Hook about 1930, where he was the first County Health Officer until his death 3 June 1932.

Randolph Hunter and Eliza Gray had two children:

(1) Sylvester Gray Hunter (b 1921) md Mada Brown Hubert.

(2) Mary Virginia Hunter (b 1927) md Howard E. Smith.

Gray Hunter was the third generation to graduate from University of Louisville Medical School in 1945. He practiced medicine in Ashland, KY and is now retired. He and Mada have four children:

(1) Randolph (Randy) Gray Hunter married Debbie Shank and have sons Charles Randolph Hunter II, Stephen Gray Hunter, James Lewis Hunter, Randolph Drew Hunter and Benjamin Ray Hunter. 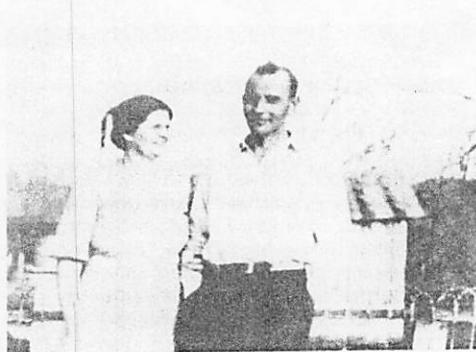
(2) Jennifer Hunter Smith married Scott Buskey and has son Brett Anthony Buskey. They live in Cumberland, Maryland.

Winfield Sherman Fyffe was born 25 July 1891, Elliott Co., KY, son of Joseph Fyffe and Mary Hutchinson. (See "Fyffes of Londonderry Ireland and Hutchinsons in The History of Elliott County 1985, Vol. I). Mollie Frances Hunter was born 17 Apr 1894, Sandy Hook, KY. Sherman and Mollie were married 25 June 1914 at her home in Sandy Hook. Their children (all born in Sandy Hook): (1) Ferné Marie Fyffe (20 Apr 1915-30 May 1986 Austin, TX) md Raymond Hinkle. They had two daughters, Patricia Ann Hinkle (b 6 Sep 1938 Richardson, KY) and Frances Jane Hinkle (b 26 Oct 1939 Ironton, OH). (2) Joseph Montgomery Fyffe, died of pneumonia while Sherman was in Army during WWI. He was unable to attend funeral. Sherman was a machinist, draftsman, tool designer and attained the title of tool engineer even though his technical education was self study. He had an inquiring mind and was continually inventing or improving things. He liked to travel and moved often. Before she entered school, his youngest child, Joyce, had lived in New Mexico and Ohio as well as Kentucky. Her primary schooling was in Blaine and Louisa before finishing in Ironton, OH. High school was Ironton, Bridgeport, and Massillon, OH before graduation from Will Rogers High School in Tulsa, OK.

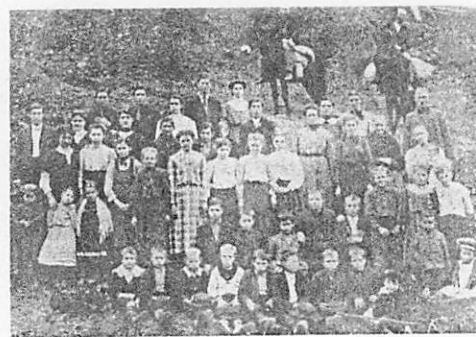

HUTCHINSONS OF ELK FORK

Many people have researched and much has been written about the Hutchinsons. Published books can be ordered from numerous authors and some are readily available in genealogical libraries. The Hutchinsons are interspersed with notable people who made a name for themselves or simply stood up for what they believed in. Anne Hutchinson is in our American history books; Andrew Jackson, our 7th President of the United States (1829-1837), whose mother was Elizabeth Hutchinson of Northern Ireland; James Hutchinson who left Kentucky for Kansas and, supposedly, Hutchinson, Kansas is named for him; and the list goes on.

I've read many accounts of ancestry; i.e., Scotch-Irish, Dutch, Pa. Dutch, Quakers, Shakers, French Huguenots, English, etc., have studied the migration patterns, talked with historians

and other genealogists, and I remain firmly convinced that the Hutchinsons were here from the very early years of our country, were numerous, staunch in their beliefs, and steadfast in their sacrifice for freedom and independence. These traits are ever present today.

In researching, I have been able to come up with a crest but no tartan as I have been told the Hutchinsons have. In Bain's, The Clans and Tartans of Scotland, the Hutchinson families are allied to clan MacDonald and they have at least six tartans, all are combinations of red and green except the hunting tartan of MacDonald of the Isles.

The Hutchinsons of Elliott and Morgan Counties are descendants of James (John) P. Hutchinson, b 1670. Some say his wife was Hannah Helton, others say Sara Hutton. My cousin, Edna Barker Hutchinson Offenbacker, had verified Sara Hutton and much of the following lineage is hers. She had worked for several years on the Hutchinson line before I became involved and always said she was going to publish the lineage and the numerous family stories that she had always been told.

James P. Hutchinson and his wife are believed to have been born in Northern Ireland and came to America in the early 1700s.

Known children of JAMES P. HUTCHINSON were:

(1) Elizabeth Hutchinson md Andrew Jackson (parents of President Andrew Jackson). Mr. Jackson died a few days before Andrew was born. (2) Martha Hutchinson md George McKeney. (3) Mary Hutchinson md John Lessley. (4) Jane Hutchinson md James Crawford. Elizabeth lived with them after her husband's death. (5) Sarah Hutchinson md Samuel Lessley. (6) Peter Hutchinson, Sr. md Nancy Green, d/o Lewis Green, Sr. Peter was born a few months after his father was killed.

Known children of PETER and NANCY GREEN HUTCHINSON, SR. were:

(1) Martha "Patsy" Hutchinson md John Porter of Mass. (2) Elizabeth "Betsey" Hutchinson md Raleigh Stallard, s/o Samuel Stallard. (3) Susan Hutchinson md Richard Wells. (4) Jim Harvey Hutchinson, never married. (5) Dave Crockett Hutchinson. (6) Emanuel Hutchinson md Sena Green — parents of Emanuel whose second wife was Nancy Cody, d/o William Cody. (7) John

grandfather Levi Sparks (1778-1851) made the perilous journey across the Appalachian Mountains to settle in Lawrence County, Kentucky. Levi, who had served as a deputy sheriff in Wilkes County, North Carolina before he decided to migrate west with a number of other families, was a son of Revolutionary War veteran John Sparks (1753-1840/41) also of Wilkes County.

Around 1821 Levi, his second wife Sarah Lyon (aunt of the Sarah Lyon who married James Ross in 1842), their six children: Calvin, Wiley, Sinay, Sarah, Nelson, and John moved to Lawrence County, Kentucky. They were accompanied by George and Colby Sparks, brothers of Levi, Jesse Lyon and four other Lyon brothers, and John Holbrook. All of these families are interrelated and the names are still very much a part of this area of eastern Kentucky.

Calvin (1806-1894) and Wiley (1808-?) Sparks both farmed in Lawrence County and it is some of their descendants who became a part of Elliott County in the 1920's: Jewell Sparks Ross, Goldie Sparks Wheeler, Junius Sparks Fraley, and the late Arvill Sparks (1899-1972) are in direct descent from Wiley through their father and from Calvin through their mother Surrida Dobyns, whose family came originally from Virginia. *Submitted by Jewell Sparks Ross*

Kimbert Rucker was born at Burke, Kentucky on Rocky Branch April 5, 1888. His paternal grandparents were Sarrye Rucker and Columbia Bayes Rucker. His maternal grandparents were Doctor Ison and Elizabeth Fraley Ison.

Kimbert had five sisters: Virgie Hower-ton, Bertha Hannah, Lummie Bailey, Phoebe (Puss) Stephens, Betty (Elizabeth) Kouns. Kimbert was the only son who lived to manhood.

His early years were spent working on the farm and in the woods for his father. On September 4, 1907, at the age of nineteen, he married Eliza Williams.

Eliza's parents were Robert A. and Amanda (Stephens) Williams. Her paternal grandparents were Bill and Rutha (Richardson) Williams. Her maternal grandparents were James and Prica (Henson) Stephens. Robert A. Williams came to Elliott County from Smith County, Virginia in 1860. Amanda Stephens came to Elliott County from South Carolina.

Kimbert and Eliza lived on Rocky Branch and on the head of Ison Creek all of their lives together. They did farming of corn and tobacco and gardening. Kimbert cut timber in the woods part time. They raised five daughters and four sons. Cleffie married Ulmont Stapleton and raised Seldon, Rollie W., Frankie, Doris, Avaneil

and Betty. They have six grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. Cora married Roy Stapleton. They had no children. Beulah married Otis Sparks and raised Kathy, Larry and Marvin. They have three grandchildren. Perry married Iva Barker and raised Mildred, Garry, Jerry, and Daniel. They have seven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. Ollie James married Mary Gillum and raised James (Skip), Felice, Carol, Penelope (Penny), and Pam. They have 11 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. Willis married Mabel Stapleton and raised Duane, Clifton, Johnny (deceased), Mark, Sharon, Karen, Sherry, and Rita. They have ten grandchildren. Amanda married Richard Barker and raised Donna, Regina, Kimberly, Bill, Richard, Robert and Timothy. They have seven grandchildren. Delphia married J.D. Gillum and raised David, Angeline, Linda, Allen and Ernie. They have nine grandchildren.

GLORIA HUTCHINSON SELF

My Elliott Co. roots begin with my ancestor, Peter Hutchinson, Jr. who moved there from Southwest Virginia about 1845 with his wife Elizabeth (Mason) and family. He was a son of Peter Hutchinson, Sr. and Nancy Green. Tradition tells that he was a cousin of President Andrew Jackson. Peter and Elizabeth were the parents of Verlina, Franklin, Sarah, John, Harvey, David, Thomas.

In 1856, Harvey, son of Peter, married Elizabeth "Betty" Mason, daughter of Thomas Jefferson Mason and Susan Green. Susan was a descendant of Lewis

Green of Virginia, a veteran of both the French and Indian War and American Revolution. Susan married James White in Scott Co., Va. and they decided to move West. They made it as far as Independence, Mo. where James died of typhoid. Stranded with her small sons, Susan decided to turn back. Soon she met Mr. Mason, who also was traveling West; he befriended her and they traveled into Ky., where they married.

Harvey was a saddlemaker by profession, but was considered to be a "jack of all trades." His wife Betty was a remarkable woman according to her grandchildren. She made her son James (my grandfather) a suit completely by hand. She gathered the wool, cleaned, carded and dyed it; then wove, cut and handsewed it. They say she smoked a corncob pipe, and even though she lived to be 99, she never left the hills or saw a train. Harvey died in 1913 and Betty in 1936. Their children were: Sarah, Logan, John, Martha, Robert, James and Susan.

My grandfather, James (Jim), was born in Elliott Co. in 1875. He married Cynthia Ison, daughter of Nancy Brickey and Archibald Ison. Nancy was a descendant of John Brickey, a Huguenot who fled France about 1680 and settled in Va. Archibald was born in 1851; a son of Byrdine and Cynthia Hanna. Cynthia's ancestry can be traced to Thirteenth Century Scotland.

Jim dabbled in several professions, but primarily ran a sawmill and general store. They decided to leave Ky. because they felt there would be better opportunities for them in Ohio. So in 1917 they took their children Ralph, Dolph, Geneva, Aubrey (my father), Lillie and Olive and bought a large farm in Ohio where Grace was born. They remained on the farm until 1928 when they moved to Norwood where Jim died in 1931. Cynthia died in 1967.

Aubrey Hutchinson was born during a Fourth of July celebration at Roscoe, in Elliott Co. in 1911. He was about six years old when his family moved to Ohio. He married Lela Scott and had two children: Bobby and Gloria. The family moved to Texas in 1949 and settled in the Dallas area. Bobby lives in Irving, TX and has two children, Kelly and Bruce. I married Dannie Self in 1962 and have two daughters, Cris and Angela. We live in DeSoto, a small town south of Dallas. I enjoy genealogy and am currently collecting information for a history of my ancestors.

James Oliver Sexton (called Oliver) born about 1834 in Russell Co. VA, son of Moses Sexton and Theny Moses was born about 1805 in Scott C. VA. He was a farmer. 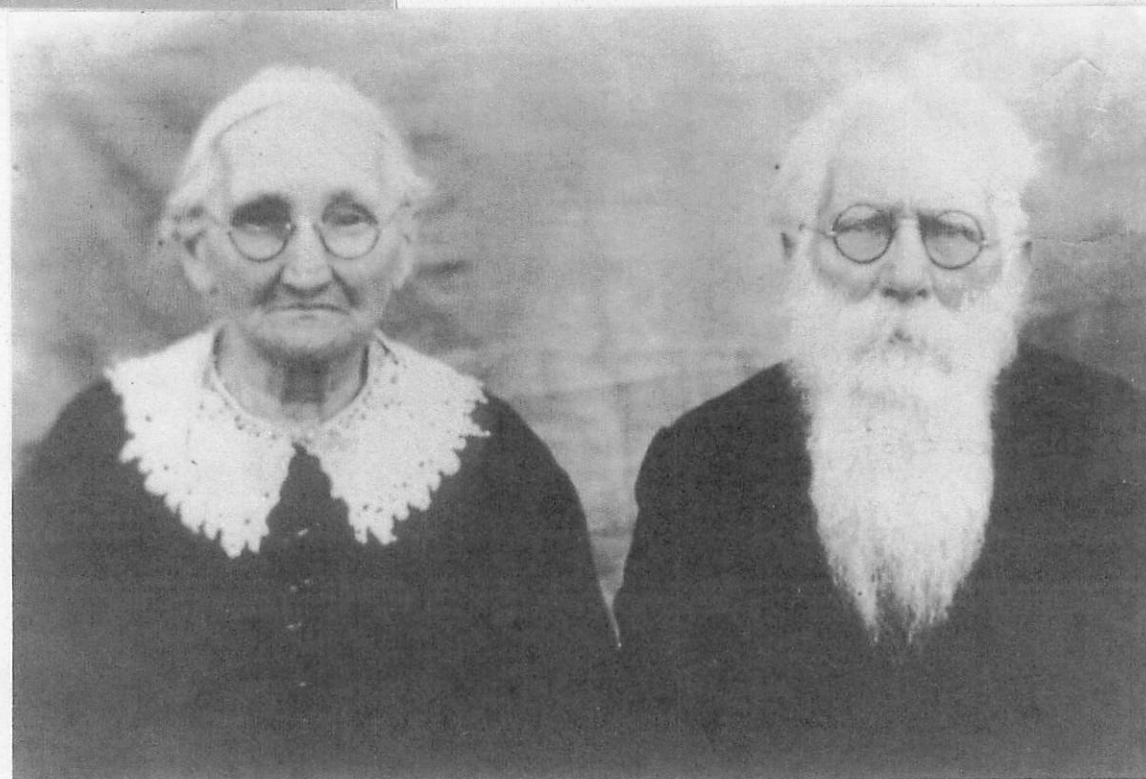

The Grinstead line traces back to Wm Grinstead I B 1634 English D 1667, who came to America in 1650. One branch of this family produced Mayor James F. Grinstead of Louisville. Grinsteads appear in The Domesday Book, 1086 AD + one was ancestor of England's Queen Mather.

The McClures + Hutchinsons both trace their lineage to the same Norwegian Viking, Godred Crovan.

HUTCHINSON - GREENMARY ELIZABETH HUTCHINSON *no. 14*

Peter Hutchinson and Nancy Green Hutchinson were the parents of Elizabeth Hutchinson who married Rawley Duncan Stallard in Washington County, Va. Nancy Green was a descendant of Lewis Green and of the Blaaws of New Jersey before 1775.

The following information was contributed by Mrs. Dicey Mills Fletcher - she had received it from Mrs. Linnie C. Stinson, a member of the Green family.

GRANDPARENTS OF MARY ELIZABETH HUTCHINSON were JAMES P. HUTCHINSON and HANNAH HOWERTON - lived near Belfast Ireland before they brought their family to Mass. about 1745. James P. Hutchinson was born 10 Jan 1692, died 12 Nov. 1748 married in 1736 Hannah Howerton born 3 June 1694 died 7 April 1770. Six families, Hutchinson, Moore, Porter, Montgomery, Col. Lewis Green, and Capt Clark were driven out of Mass. because of their loyalties to England. From Mass. they went to N.C. to Tenn. to Virginia.

LEWIS GREEN - Grandfather of Mary Elizabeth Hutchinson.

LEWIS GREEN SR., b ca 1724 d Oct 1784 on the "Blue Spring Road" near Glasgow, Ky. He served in Captain Robert McKenzie's Co. in the French and Indian War, and by trade was a carpenter. (Va. Magazine of History & Biography, Vol. 1 Page 378) No record of his wife's name.

Charles Barker of Ashland, Ky. is preparing a Green Family History. A Green family reunion is held in Ashland, Ky. each summer.

Two Peter Hutchinsons are recorded by the War Department as Revolutionary Soldiers. One was in the Cavalry and died in Ky. The following record would seem to be our ancestor.

ARCHIVES BUILDING, CONSTITUTION AVE., WASHINGTON, D.C. - Gist's Regiment, Peter Hutchinson, Pvt. under Capt. Sam Lapsley's Company of Col. Nathaniel Gist's Regiment, Rev. War, appeared on Company Pay Roll of the Organization named above for the month of May 1778. When enlisted - commencement of pay March 16-17. Time of service 2 mo. and 15 days - pay per month 6 and 2/3 dollars... Remarks: ...Peter Hutchinson. Private - Capt Sam Lapsley's Co. of Col. Nat. Gist's Regiment...several times and amounts of pay...Casualties - left sick at Carlyle Ferry. In Aug 1778 -sick absent...time of service three years...paid in currency, remarks -deserted ...Oct. 23... further pay records under Capt. Lapsley.

NOTE: The Archivist says that if a soldier was lost trace of, he was recorded as a deserter.

Rev. Emmanuel Hutchinson, a descendant who lived in Wise County, Va. (now deceased) claimed that Peter Hutchinson was captured by the British.

Peter Hutchinson Jr. stated his father was in the Revolutionary War and was captured by the British. The Rev. A. J. Wolfe believed Peter Hutchinson was a Tory and came from Massachusetts to Virginia at an early age.

Rev. A. J. Wolfe wrote to Mrs. Maude Humphreys June 8, 1932—that he was a descendant by both his father and mother, who were third cousins, from the Hutchinson family of Elizabeth. The Hutchinsons left Va. while Wolfe was still a lad and went to Ky. Wolfe's great grandmother Elizabeth Hutchinson he knew little about. His grandmother, Verlina Hutchinson, married Andrew Jackson Addington, his grandfather. Mr. Wolfe believed Nancy Green was a niece of Col. John Green—no relation to Gen. Nathaniel Gren. This Col. Green was called General in Culpeper records (Raleigh Travis Green). In D.A.R. records there was a Surgeon John Green of Va. whose descendants may be of this family. Mr. Compton says the charge that Peter Hutchinson was a Tory is not true, but in fact he was a veteran of the American Revolution.

LETTER FROM RAWLEY DUNCAN STALLARD OF SCOTT COUNTY, VA. TO HIS OLDEST SON SAMUEL DUNCAN STALLARD IN POCAHONTAS, ILL. Letter provided by Mrs. Maude Humphreys, descendant of Samuel Duncan Stallard of Ill.

Scott County
May the 15th 1829

Dear son and daughter—I once more raise my pen to write a few lines to you and let you know that your father and mother and sisters and brothers are all in a reasonable state of health at this time through mercy hoping that these lines will find you and your little family enjoying the same Blessings. I have nothing strange to write to you but I have the happiness to inform you that I received your letter April 4th which was dated December 27, 1828 and I was hartily glad to hear that you and your little family were all well. Thank the Lord that we are still blest with time and opportunity to write to each other for it does gladden my heart to hear and see my children being well and doing the same though times seem hard on account of the scarcity of money, taxes high and the market of things low but these things we must bear. But I still think that industry and care

Four of the sisters (Margaret, Jennett, Mary, and Grace) had already settled in the Wapahaws before 1765. Jennett and James Crawford had moved there from Cumberland County, Pennsylvania in 1760.

MARY ELIZABETH HUTCHINSON

Peter Hutchinson and Nancy Green Hutchinson were the parents of Elizabeth Hutchinson who married Rawley Duncan Stallard in Washington County, Va. Nancy Green was a descendant of Lewis Green and of the Blaaws of New Jersey before 1775.

The following information was contributed by Mrs. Dicey Mills Fletcher - she had received it from Mrs. Linnie C. Stinson, a member of the Green family.

GRANDPARENTS OF MARY ELIZABETH HUTCHINSON were JAMES P. HUTCHINSON and HANNAH HOWERTON - lived near Belfast Ireland before they brought their family to Mass. about 1745. James P. Hutchinson was born 10 Jan 1692, died 12 Nov. 1748 married in 1736 Hannah Howerton born 3 June 1694 died 7 April 1770. Six families, Hutchinson, Moore, Porter, Montgomery, Col. Lewis Green, and Capt Clark were driven out of Mass. because of their loyalties to England. From Mass. they went to N.C. to Tenn. to Virginia.

1. Elizabeth Hutchinson b 1737 in Ireland m Andrew Jackson. After the family had been in America awhile Elizabeth got homesick and went back to Ireland where she married her lover, Andrew Jackson. 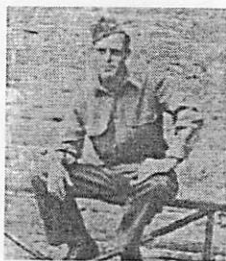

MOORE-BRADLEY, William Sheridan Moore (b. Feb. 17, 1868 in Rowan County, KY) was the son of James Marion Moore and Martha Jane (Branham) Moore. He was married to Mary Anna (Bradley) Moore (second marriage) and to this union was born 10 children, including twin daughters, along with two step children, Herbert "Herb" Bradley and James Moore.

William Sheridan Moore served Rowan County as magistrate and was a farmer and a carpenter. He built numerous houses in and around the Morehead area, and also helped build the train depot in Morehead. He was a staunch Republican and expressed his political feelings most freely.

This family's home was located at the head of Big Brushy with William Sheridan Moore building their house and all the other buildings from trees on their farm. All of the children walked four miles (one way) to the Big Brushy School House. On their way to and from school they would stop and carve their initials on a beech tree which is still standing today) and would skip rope, play marbles and various games.

Three of their daughters were married at the ole homeplace: Emma Susan married Joseph Humphries; Effie married Roy Reed on March 1,

1919; and Clara married Taylor Reed on July 12, 1919. Preacher Charlie Roberts united them.

Mary Anna (Bradley) Moore was born in Carter County, KY on Dec. 29, 1869, daughter of George Wesley Bradley and Louanna (Gearheart) Bradley. She cleaned houses for people in Morehead and reared 10 children and two step children. She died March 25, 1920 and is buried in the family cemetery located on the ole homeplace on Big Brushy.

William Sheridan Moore died in Highland County, OH at the home of his daughter, Clara (Moore) Reed on Dec. 24, 1959 and is buried at the family cemetery (Bradley-Moore) on the ole homeplace. He and his wife, Mary Anna (Bradley) Moore had the following children: Emma Susan, Thomas Marion, Charles Sherman, Effie (twin), Ethel (twin), Iva, Clara, Roy, Louanna and Lyda.

Their daughter Louanna Moore was born Jan. 6, 1907 in Rowan County, KY at the ole homeplace at the head of Big Brushy. She was married to Clarence Reed, from Fleming County, KY, on July 25, 1923. To this union was born four children: Albert Lorne, Maxine Moore, Warren Kendall and Glenda Gay. She died May 11, 1973 in Adams County, OH and is buried in Charter Oak Cemetery at Aberdeen, OH. Submitted by Glenda Ruggles.

MOORE-MESSER, William Preston "Will" Messer (b. Oct. 18, 1892, d. Dec. 8, 1970) was the son of Madison and Betsy Melton Messer. He had six brothers and sisters: Rob, Beige, Benton, Jane, Margaret and Molly. Most of his brothers and sisters moved to Wisconsin and Indiana in their youth except for Jane who lived in Fleming County.

Will worked for General Refractories as a clay miner on Walker Branch, Open Fork, Andy White Branch and Old House Creek. He was also a farmer on Christy Creek. He was due to be called to active duty on the next call up during WWI, but the war ended before the call came.

Will married Louada Moore on Aug. 9, 1915 at Christy, KY in Rowan County. Louada (b. May 18, 1895, d. June 24, 1963) was the daughter of James Moore (b. Feb. 17, 1847 in North Carolina, d. March 4, 1921) and Amanda Susan Parrish (b. March 2, 1866, d. April 22, 1946). Louada had 10 brothers and sisters: Isaac (md. Mattie Early); Lucy (md. Kendrick Messer; Lora (md. Elizabeth Weaver); Harold Lee (died as infant); Millard (md. Louvena Templeman); Bertalee; Ina Bell (md. Charlie Goodman); Claude (md. Nancy Largin); Clyde; Adeline (md. (1st) Roy Alfrey and (2nd) Elton Johnson). Louada also had four half brothers and sisters: William Sheridan (Square Bill) Moore, George Sherman Moore, Elizabeth Moore (md. George McDaniel) and Harrison Leonard Moore.

Louada was a homemaker and a member of the Primitive Baptist Church. Will and Louada enjoyed the fellowship of the church and attended regularly at the various church locations in Rowan County. They had four children: Aileen (b. April 17, 1917, d. June 5, 1994) md. Ott Roark (b. Feb. 21, 1920, d. Jan. 24, 2002); Chlotean (b. March 24, 1919, d. Feb. 21, 2001) md. Walter "Tag" Calvert (b. Dec. 25, 1914, d. Feb. 8, 1989); Ruth (b. Feb. 9, 1923) md. Harlan James (b. Sept. 1, 1921, d. Dec. 21, 1987); James (b. April 13, 1926) md. Mary Thompson (b. Oct. 6, 1928).

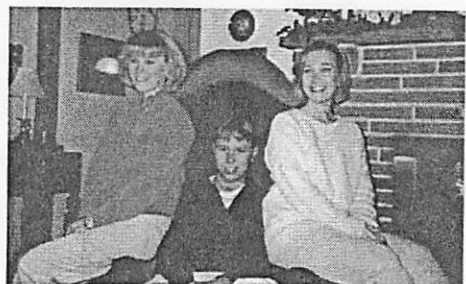

NEFF-HUTCHINSON, Susan Jane Hutchinson was born July 28, 1946 in Lexington, KY. Her parents were Alpha Milton Hutchinson and Mildred Clay Randall. Susan married Robert Dennis Neff in Clintwood, VA on Feb. 10, 1968. The father of Susan Neff was Alpha. He was born April 13, 1919 on Elkfork in Morgan County, KY. His parents were David Roscoe Hutchinson and Mirinda Evelyn Conley Hutchinson. The parents of David Roscoe were Henry Milton and Elizabeth Thompson Hutchinson. Henry Milton and Elizabeth came from Levitt, VA around the 1850s. Henry Milton ran a general store, farmed and was a postmaster in Redwine. Henry Milton joined the 40th Regiment of the Kentucky Infantry in September 1863. He was discharged Dec. 30, 1864 in Catlettsburg. He attained the rank of corporal.

At this time not much is known about Elizabeth. Mirinda's parents were William Frances Conley (b. Dec. 3, 1843, d. Dec. 8, 1917). Her mother was Anna Jane Fyffe. She was born Aug. 12 (not sure of year) and she died April 22 in the 1900s.

The children of David R. and Mirinda Hutchinson were: Curt (md. Emma), Clifford (md. Margrete), Alpha (md. Mildred), Dora (md. Ward Williams), Dortha (md. Marvin Cales) and David R. Hutchinson Jr. (md. Jean).

David Roscoe and Mirinda moved to Morehead in September 1923. They moved from Morgan County on the back of a flatbed train. The train was called the Blue Goose. Alpha was born April 13, 1919 and passed away Jan. 8, 2001. Mildred was born Jan. 5, 1922 and passed way March 1, 2002.

Mildred's parents were Everett Randall and Pearl Caudill Randall. They were from Powell County. Everett's parents were John (b. 1863, death unknown) and Nancy Combs (all we have at this point on Nancy are her parents, James Combs and Jane Howard Combs. Pearl Caudill Randall's parents were Jane Deeds Caudill and Greenberry Caudill.

Pearl Caudill married Everett Randall. Before moving to Morehead, Everett rode horseback to teach. He also worked in a coal mine. Everett also served in WWI. His registration shows the year to be 1918. The Randalls moved to Rowan County when Mildred was about five. Mildred was raised in Morehead where she attended Breckinridge Training School. Everett Randall was born May 9, 1896 in Stanton, KY. Everett died Dec. 22, 1961 in Jefferson County. At the time of his death he worked for Louisville Tin and Stove Company (a hardware company).

Pearl Caudill Randall was a housewife and very involved in the Morehead United Methodist Church, Eastern Star, The Knife, Spoon and Fork Club. She was also a member of the DAR. Everett also took part in church and the Masons. Pearl Caudill Randall's parents moved from Sturgeon Creek to Powell County. Her parents were Greenberry and Jane Deeds Caudill. They both passed away on the same day, March 14, 1950. Neither knew the other died. One in Lexington, the other in Stanton. They are buried in the Stanton Cemetery.

Alpha Milton and Mildred Randall Hutchinson married Aug. 19, 1939. They had a child Susan Jane Hutchinson Neff. When Susan was about five they had a son John Curtis. He only lived about five months. He was born with a heart defect which in today's time could be fixed.

Mildred was a wonderful mother and wife. She loved animals. She would pick Susan up at school with their scottie dog, Mike. Mildred had fun growing up in Morehead. She told Susan how they use to roller skate all over Morehead. They would even start at the top of the hill by the old swimming pool and skate all the way to Main Street. In today's time, a person would be killed. She ran around with her cousins, Dorothy, Virginia and Robert Caudill, children of her Uncle Dudley Caudill. Her best friend was Sancy Proctor. She dreamed of being a pilot. Mildred's idol was Amelia Earhart. She loved to hike and play in the hills behind the university. Also, Mildred loved to swim. She and her friends would pretend they were Ester Williams or play Tarzan in the water. Mildred had a wonderful time growing up.

Susan attended Breckinridge Training School. Robert attended school in Massillon, OH. He finished his high school years in Canton, OH at Canton South High School. Susan and Robert both attended Morehead State University. They moved away after Robert graduated. At that time, they had one child, Jennifer Susan Neff Markwell (Danny). She was born Oct. 1, 1968 at St. Claire Hospital. Susan and Robert moved to Ft. Mitchell, KY. Robert worked at First National Bank of Cincinnati (now Star Bank). There he went through all of the departments in the bank. They lived in Northern Kentucky for about five years. While there they had another child, Heather Jane Hutchinson Neff (at the time of this writing engaged to marry Brandin Perkins June 25, 2005). Heather was born May 12, 1974 at St. Elizabeth Hospital, Covington, KY on Mother's Day. Before Heather turned 1 Susan and Robert moved to Frankfort, KY where Robert worked for Investors Heritage Insurance Company. They lived in Frankfort about three years. They moved back to Morehead in 1978. Robert began working for his father-in-law, Alpha Hutchinson. When Robert came back to Morehead he was vice president of The Citizens Bank. In November of that year Ryan Derek Neff was born on Nov. 20, 1978.

Susan has since formed Mothers Against Drunk Driving in Rowan County. She also began The Morehead Red Hatters. After her father Alpha passed away, Susan became chairman of the board of The Citizens Bank. Robert is CEO and President.

Susan's most vivid memories of growing up are very happy times. Morehead was a very small town then, where everyone knew everyone and helped each other. She and her parents always went on summer vacations. Also, she went to Breckinridge Training School as her mother did. Breckinridge was a very close school. Small classes and most all of the children were friends and had fun together. Also, youth fellowship at the Methodist Church meant a lot to her. Here she was baptized and confirmed, Susan's grandparents almost lived backyard to backyard. She enjoyed being with them and playing at their homes. At the time Susan grew up you could walk to town and shop. She and her friends would walk to town, buy a coke and read comics at Battson's Drug Store. Bishop's Drug Store she remembers had the most delicious hot fudge sundaes. Life in Morehead was calm and easy going.

Jennifer Susan Neff is married to Dan Markwell. They have four children: Grant Matthew Hutchinson Markwell, Candace Jane Markwell, and twins, Garrison Roger and Gabriel Robert Markwell.

Ryan Derek Neff married the former Debbie Shurtleworth. Ryan is presently vice president of The Citizens Bank.

At the time of this writing, Heather Jane Hutchinson Neff is engaged to marry Brandin Perkins on June 25, 2005 in Florida. Heather is the Human Resource Officer.

On his father's side, Robert's grandparents were Victor and Mary Russell Neff. On his mother's side, his grandparents were from Slovenia. They came to Ellis Island when very young. His grandparents names were Meri Anslover and Ignatius Butcher (Buchar). Victor and Mary R. Neff were from around Zanesville, OH.

Robert's parents were John Paul and Mary Louise Butcher Neff. Bob's dad was a lead man at

Automatic Steel Products. His mother, who was extremely talented in voice, chose to stay home and raise their eight children. Mary had the voice of an angel. She was a devoted mom and loved to sing, garden and talk politics. John was a wonderful father and loved to cook. This has been passed down to his son Bob and also grandsons. Bob's dad used to make candy and sell it. Bob's father was born May 7, 1912 and passed away June 30, 1968. Mary was born Jan. 3, 1913 and passed away Sept. 11; 1997. They are buried in North Industry, OH, a part of Canton, OH. Their children are Jack, Judi, Kathy, Robert, Chris, Monica, Mary Lynne and Eric. They were lucky enough to have 13 grandchildren. 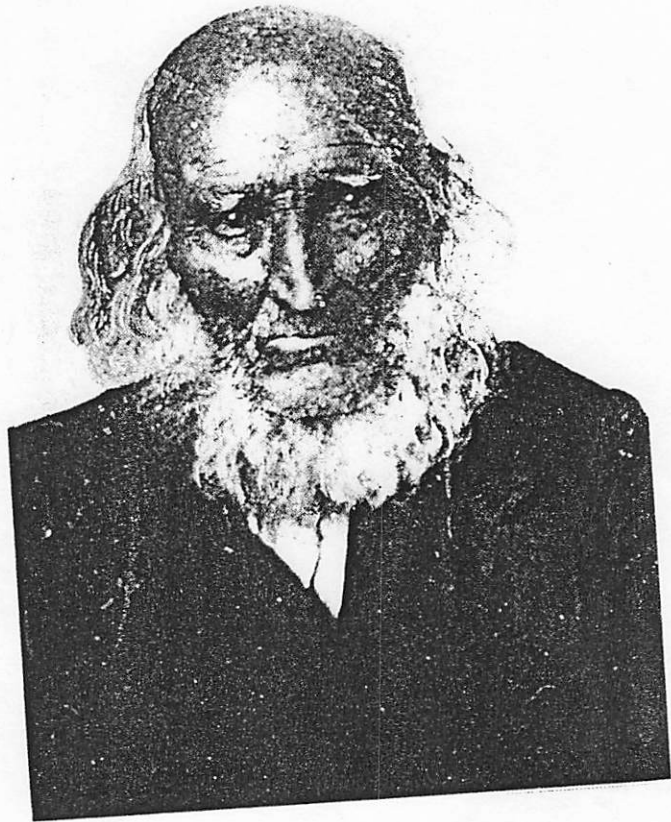

NICKELL, James Andrew Nickell (b. Dec. 22, 1842, d. Dec. 3, 1935) was the son of Robert Nickell and Rachel Patterson. In 1854 when Jim Andy (what he liked to be called) was 12 years old, he moved from Grange City, KY with his father Robert, his step mother Rachel Cogswell, and his three sisters: Martha, Cassandrew and Elizabeth, to settle east of the Rodburn area of Rowan County. They lived near the Burns family. Jim Andy once plowed and tended corn on what is now Main Street. At that time there were only a few houses in what is now Morehead. As a small boy Jim Andy received his education from his sister Martha, who conducted a subscription school in their home. Subscription schools were



CHARLES CROMWELL ADDINGTON

CHARLES CROMWELL ADDINGTON, the centenarian, was born in Culpepper County, Virginia, October 10, 1777, and died at his home on Copper Creek, January 18, 1882, aged one hundred and four years. His father, William Addington, was born in London, England, and grew up to young manhood in that city. He had excellent educational opportunities, and in consequence thereof, acquired a good education. About the time he reached the age of twenty, a steady stream of emigrants was then flowing from the city of London and other parts of Great Britain into the North American Colonies. Young Addington was also seized with the desire to join the throng and emigrate to America, much against the wish of his parents. They tried to dissuade him from going but failed. At length his father, seeing that he was determined on making the adventure, furnished him with money

to pay his passage overseas and supply his needs for some time afterward. On landing at Norfolk, he traveled widely through eastern Virginia and North Carolina, and finally located near Culpepper Courthouse, Virginia. Here he married Margaret Cromwell, about the year 1774. When the Revolutionary War began, William Addington volunteered, and was made a commissary officer in Washington's army. He served in this capacity until the Surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown, October 19, 1781, an event which he witnessed.

Soon after the War, William Addington moved to Caswell County, North Carolina, where he remained a short time. Hearing of a rich country in southwest Virginia where the land was good, the range fine, and bear, deer, and wild turkeys in abundance, he decided to seek this wonderful country. In the summer of 1785, he, in company with twelve other families, came to Russell County, Virginia, where he located in the Valley, north of the mountain, near Hyter's Gap.

Charles Cromwell Addington was a boy about eight years old when his father located on the southwest Virginia frontier. Among the immigrant families from North Carolina which settled about Hyter's Gap, was one named Doty; Anna, a daughter of this family, became the wife of Charles Cromwell Addington on January 2, 1802, and, in April of the same year, he located on Clinch River, within the present limits of Scott County, at a place known as the William Gillenwaters farm. This farm then had about ten acres of cleared land; the river bottoms were wet and marshy. During his residence there, the family contracted fever and ague, in consequence of which the location was adjudged unhealthful, and he removed to Copper Creek in the spring of 1805, where he lived until his death in 1882.

When Charles Addington first came to Russell County, that section was often visited by hostile Indians. His home was located near a fort to which the family often had occasion to flee for safety. He frequently related, in substance, the following story as having occurred near his home:

In the year 1790, the Indians made several raids in the neighborhood of Hyter's Gap. On one of these raids the house of a neighbor, named Musick, was attacked just at the break of day. Stealthily approaching the house, the Indians shot and killed Musick through a crack in the wall. They then forced an entrance and took his wife and nine children captive. It was three or four hours before the depredation became known to the neighborhood. Musick's dead body was accidentally discovered by someone who called at his house on an errand. As soon as the murder became known, the rifle-bearing men of the neighborhood gathered at the Musick homestead, and women and children were rushed to the fort for protection. The trail of the Indians was soon found, and the riflemen went in hasty pursuit. But the enemy, by this time, were about nine hours travel ahead of their pursuers. Late the third evening the scouts came in sight of the Indians as they were kindling their first camp fire. A council of war was held to determine the best manner of attack to rout the enemy and save the lives of the prisoners. It was decided that an attack should not be made until dawn the next morning. The plan of attack was: All were to charge the camp at full speed, one-third of the company were to discharge their guns into the air

over the camp to make the Indians believe they were being shot at, the remaining two-thirds were to hold their fire in reserve, and shoot to kill if necessary. It was hoped in this way to so frighten the Indians that they would break camp and run without killing any of the captives. The plan succeeded admirably; the Indians fled headlong, leaving the prisoners unharmed, and much valuable plunder behind. Thus Mrs. Musick and her children were restored to her friends.

Charles Cromwell Addington was thrice married and twice widowed. The date of his first marriage has been given. March 15, 1840, he married Sarah Butcher, who died ————. January 4, 1869, he married Susan Moore, a widow, who survived him.

On October 10, 1877, his numerous posterity, and friends, honored him with a Centennial Dinner. On a table about two hundred feet long, the best food of the neighborhood was generously spread, and more than a thousand persons partook of the dinner.

On his one hundredth birthday, it was estimated that he had reared sixteen children, and had one hundred and seven grandchildren, four hundred and forty-three great-grandchildren, and seventeen great, great-grandchildren, making five hundred and fifty-three in all.

WILLIAM ADDINGTON

William Addington, son of William and Margaret [Cromwell] Addington, was born September 9, 1783 in Caswell County, North Carolina, died June 20, 1857 in Scott County, VA of Melancholy (Scott Co. Death Register 1853-1896). Married about 1807 to Sarah Stallard, born about 1790 in Washington County, now Scott County, VA, died about 1867 in Scott County, VA, (Scott Co. Minutes of the Stony Creek Primitive Baptist Church), daughter of Samuel and Jael [Duncan] Stallard.

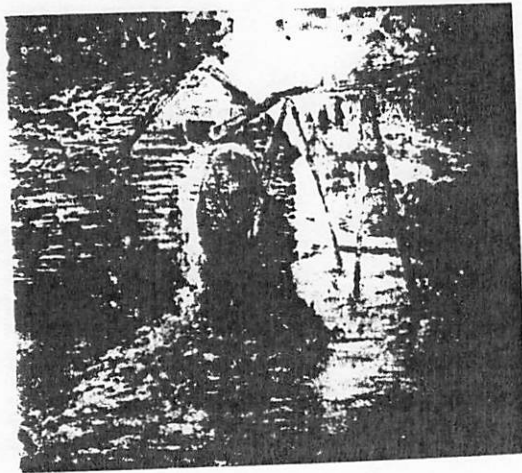

The Stony Creek Primitive Baptist Church was located at Fort Blackmore, Scott Co., VA.

William Addington, II signed the petition to form Scott County, VA in 1814 as William EDENTON. William was a blacksmith by trade and built and owned a wool carding mill near McClain's Fish Trap referred to in later deeds as Bevins Branch, Benge Branch or Benge's Branch.

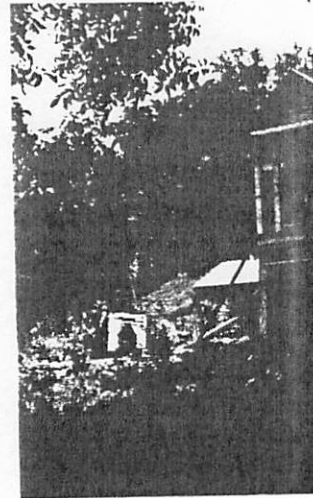


Sketch of the Addington Mill

This land is located near present day Dungannon, Scott Co., VA. The mill became the possession of James Addington after the death of William Addington, II. This mill, built by William Addington, was later known as the Semones Mill.

On September 14, 1835 (Scott County Deed Book 5, page 176) a land transaction between David Cox and D. Nelson to William Addington and Thomas Strong, land for a Baptist Church, 2 acres to be called Stony Creek Baptist Church. Both Sarah and William were members of this church.

On September 15, 1834 (Scott County Deed Book 5, page 349) William and Sarah "Sally" sold to Peter Stallard and his heirs a parcel of land on the south side of Clinch River.



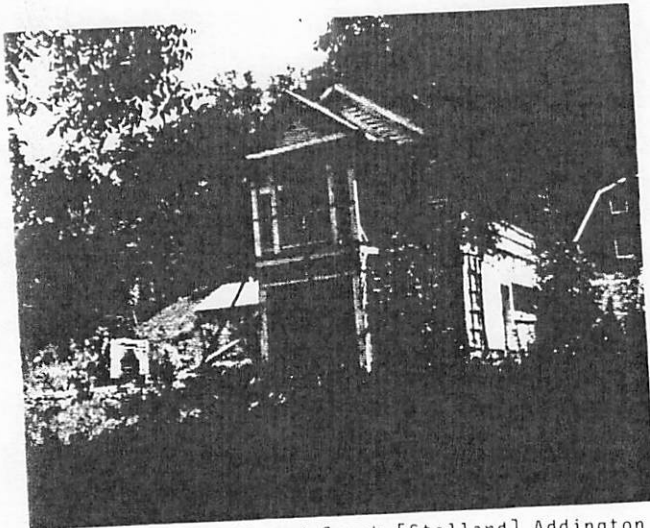

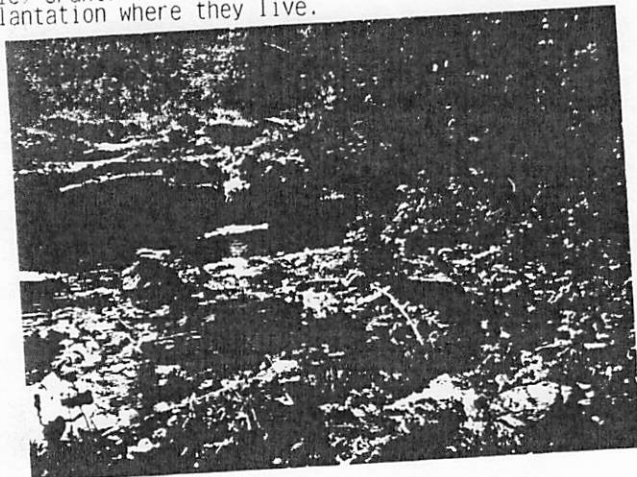

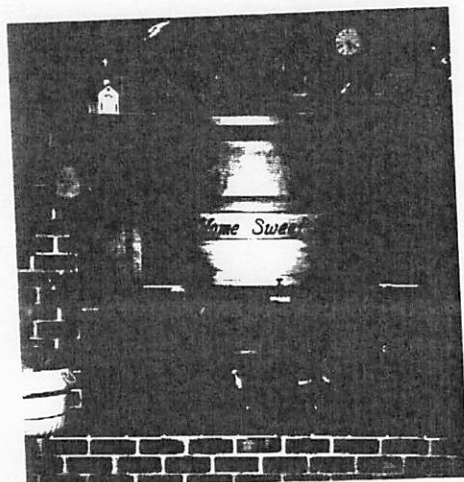

In Sarah's later years, she gained a great deal of weight but still maintained a strong desire to attend church. However, due to her large size, walking or riding in a wagon were not possible. So, a special canoe was constructed to float her down the river to Church.

Clarice Lee relates a story told by Sarah to Eliza Jane [Addington] Semones concerning the time when "as a small child, Sarah went to hunt the cows and saw the barefoot tracks on the sandrocks in Benges Creek. They were made by the Indians. She went home and told what she had seen and a posse was formed to follow them. Benges had captured some white women and children. He was followed into Lee County, VA, where later he was killed in the cut between Big Stone Gap and Appalachia, VA by Vincent Hobbs, leader of the Lee County Posse.

In 1992, Nancy Clark Brown purchased a wooden mantle from the old home of William II and Sarah [Stallard] Addington. The mantle came from the center room of what became more commonly known as "the old Semones home". The center section was originally built by William II and Sarah [Stallard] Addington. The two story log home, built about 1815, had one large room on each floor. Later additions were made by James Addington and the Semones family, with wings on each side of the original structure. Beside the mantle, in the original house, were built-in walnut cabinets. The mantle has found a new home, surrounding the fireplace of Violet Clark Baker, a descendant of William II and Sarah.

The land originally owned by William Addington II and his wife, Sarah Stallard was sold to his sons William Addington, III and James Addington, in return for maintenance of the plantation. From William III and James the land passed to James Addington. From James the land again changed hands, being sold to James Stallard. From James the land was again sold, this time to Moses Hoge Semones.

According to the records of Audrey Mullins Treu, the name of William Addington, II, comes down through her family as William ROBERT Addington.

Margaret married a second time to Emanuel Hutchinson on June 15, 1840. Emanuel was born about 1800 in present day Scott County, son of Peter and Nancy Green Hutchinson. Peter Hutchinson served in the Revolutionary War in Gist's Regiment as a Private under Capt. Sam Lapsley's Company of Colonel Nathaniel Gist's Regiment. He appeared on the Company Payroll for the month of May, 1778. In August 1778 he left the company at Carlyle's Ferry, sick, the total time of his service was three years.

Both Emanuel and Peter, Jr. stated that their father was captured and held prisoner by the British. [Records of the Archives, Washington, DC]. Peter

according to family legend was a brother of Elizabeth Hutchinson, mother of Andrew Jackson, President of the United States. Family legend further says that Peter came from Ireland to the American Colonies along with his five sisters to join their husbands. This tradition is borne out by several Andrew Jackson biographies, which state that Elizabeth came to the American Colonies with four sisters and a brother. The brother's name is not mentioned.

According to additional family stories, after the death of his mother in an epidemic, Andrew spent some time with his uncle, Peter, on the Clinch River settlements and it was probably here that he first met his future wife, Rachel Donelson, who lived with her father in the Holston River Settlements.

Emanuel was a clergyman in the Methodist-Protestant Church and Margaret was his third wife. In the 1880 Wise County, VA Census, Lipps District, neighborhood of Bull Run, family #64 is Emanuel Hutchinson, age 80, widowed, living with his son and retired, born in Virginia.

Margaret, like her ancestor William I and so many of the other Addingtons apparently suffered from Melancholy, may be due to the many personal losses she had suffered, she ended her own life by hanging, in the loom house.

Emanuel and Margaret [Addington] Hutchinson were living in Russell (Wise Co.) County, VA on August 14, 1854 as shown in Scott County Deed Book 11, page 27, where Emanuel Hutchinson of Russell County sold to Reuben D. Wolfe, of Scott County, for the sum of \$600.00 his land on the south side of Clinch River, corner to the old Ritchie tract to the bank of Green's Branch, bordering the land of Thomas Moore.

Emanuel Hutchinson and Margaret were found on the 1860 Wise County Census living near Pound where Emanuel was a Methodist Minister. Judging by their neighbors they probably lived in the Hickory Gap section of Birchfield Creek.

Margaret was buried with her father and mother, William II and Sarah [Stallard] Addington on the bluff overlooking Clinch River, near Dungannon, VA. This cemetery is commonly known as the Moore's Cemetery. Also buried in this cemetery are: Rawley Duncan Stallard, Elizabeth Hutchinson Stallard, Peter Hutchinson Nancy Green Hutchinson, Thomas Moore, Frances Stallard Moore, among others. It is believed that a church once stood near this cemetery and hence it was a church ground, rather than a private family cemetery. A visit to this cemetery indicates that there are nearly 100 graves, but few are marked.

JOSEPH ADDINGTON, son of [Stallard] Addington, Scott County, VA, died VA., buried in the Adams Branch, VA.

Married June 8, 1840 in Scott County, VA to Polly Bevens, born 1818 in Scott County, VA, died 1891 in Wise County, VA. Register states that her occupation was that of the daughter of Abraham Bevens. Abraham's children: Lucinda Bevens.

Polly Bevens married first to Joseph Addington of Scott County and second to David of the Big Glades, "no record" served as the Postmaster to read or write. Polly's business of the Post Office was 2 acres of land for the Courthouse and their home is located.

The 1858 Wise County Tax List shows Addington owned 200 acres of the Courthouse on the purchased from James G. Laurel section of Wise County, the richest coal land in Wise County.

JOSEPH ADDINGTON, son of William II and Sarah (Stallard) Addington, was born July 22, 1816 in Scott County, VA, died July 22, 1897 in Wise County, VA., buried in the Addington Cemetery on Rocky Fork, Wise County, VA.

Married June 8, 1840 in Scott County, VA to Malinda Bevins, born 1818 in Scott County, VA, died March 17, 1891 in Wise County, VA. The Wise County Death Register states that she died of heart dropsey and her occupation was that of a homemaker. Malinda was the daughter of Abraham Compton and Mary "Polly" Bevins. Abraham Compton and Polly Bevins also had children: Lucinda Bevins and George Washington Bevins.

Polly Bevins married first Walter Stallard of Scott County and second to Daniel Ramey called the "Monarch of the Big Glades," now Wise, VA. Daniel Ramey served as the Postmaster of Big Glades, but as unable to read or write, Polly transacted the day to day business of the Post Office. Daniel and Polly donated 2 acres of land for the construction of the Wise County Courthouse and their house stood where the 1929 annex is located.

The 1858 Wise County Tax List indicates that Joseph Addington owned 200 acres of land, 5 miles northwest of the Courthouse on the waters of Guest River purchased from James Green, now known as the Big Laurel section of Wise. This land was some of the richest coal land in Wise County.

On March 3, 1882, Joseph Addington purchased 689 acres of land on the Rocky Fork of Guest River in Wise County from the Commonwealth of Virginia (Wise County Deed Book 5, page 656). This land was in addition to the above mentioned 200 acres. The majority of the land is still in the possession of his descendants.

Emma (Addington) Adkins stated that her grandparents (Joseph and Malinda) lived in a large two-story hewn log house on Rocky Fork. The interior walls were covered with wallpaper, a rare occurrence during this period.

Still in existence is a lithograph by Currier (pre Currier & Ives) of the Empress Josephine which hung in the dining room of Joseph and Malinda's home. Malinda was a meticulous housekeeper who wove carpets to cover all the floors of her home.
